### JIM DEITCH FOR NEVADA REGENT "C"

Jim Deitch, 47, of 2416 Karli Drive has filed his candidacy for University of Nevada Regent in District C.

A Southern Nevada resident for 21 years, Deitch said he filed for the non-partisan office "as a citizen interested in becoming involved in the guidance and growth of our state university system."

"I have seen the University of Nevada, Las Vegas develop from nothing to the dynamic institution that it is today," he said, "and I am interested in furthering that growth in every way possible."

According to Deitch, "A university is much more than simply a group of impressive buildings. It is the soul and spirit of a community and it is a community's greatest investment in its future."

"I have seen too many of our young people leave the area and the state to seek academic and professional training elsewhere. This is a trend which must be stopped," he stated.

The candidate said in principle he favors the idea of starting a law school at UNLV, but before supporting it he would want to make sure that it would be economically feasible.

Deitch said the decision to run against incumbent Helen Thompson for a six-year term was a lifficult one to make because he believes she has done a creditable

"I did decide to run, however, because I believe the citizens and voters are entitled to alternatives and to fresh viewpoints."

Deitch is a graduate of the University of Southern California, with a degree in journalism. He is certified as a vocational teacher by the State Board of Education and has often been a guest lecturer at the university and local high schools on journalism, advertising and tourist pro-
