WARREN STANLEY FOR NLV CONSTABLE

NORTH LAS VEGAS — Warren T. Stanley, 70, of 2043 Glider St. has filed for reelection for a fifth term as North Las Vegas constable.

Stanley, a Democrat, was first appointed to the office in 1960 when it was created by an act of the Legislature. He was then elected to four succeeding terms.

He entered law enforcement in 1948 as a special deputy sheriff and served for ten years as chief deputy constable in the Las Vegas Constable's Office.

Stanley and his wife, Josephine, have been residents of North Las Vegas since 1946. They say they have seen the community grow from an unincorporated town to the third largest city in Nevada.

Stanley is a member of the Elks Lodge, past president of the Nevada Constables Association, past president and present member of the board of directors of the International Footprint Association Chapter No. 9 and a member of the Nevada Peace Officers Association.

If reelected, the candidate says he will continue to fulfill the duties of the office to the best of his ability.

"These duties," says Stanley, "unknown to most people, require attentiveness to the job at least ten to 12 hours a day and seven days a week."

JACK SCHOFIELD FOR STATE SENATE

Assemblyman Jack Schofield (D-LV) filed as a candidate for one of the three state senate seats in Las Vegas District Three, and pledged to carry on a multifaceted legislative program.

Schofield, 50, is now serving his second term in the legislature and was chairman of the Assembly Education Committee, vice chairman of the Ways & Means committee, chairman of the Clark County legislative delegation and chairman of the Ways & Means subcommittee to fund education.

He resides at 1308 S. Eighth Street, and is the Clark County School District's planning and zoning coordinator. Prior to that he was a high school science teacher and a fighter-bomber pilot in World War II, serving under Gen. Clair Chennault in the famed Flying Tigers. He was recalled for the Korean War.

"As a senator," Schofield said, "I will continue to work

for continued support to quality education in Nevada. Our young boys and girls and men and women are this state's greatest legacy, and they must have the proper tools to build for tomorrow."

Schofield, a Democrat, has campaigned actively for approval of a law school in Nevada, which he said will greatly enhance the image of the state and its university and would stem the outward flow of bright young people to other states where there are law schools.

TOM LEEN FOR ASS EMBLY. 4

Attorney Tom Leen, who filed for State Assembly, District 4, has established an outstanding record of public service.

He is former Executive Director of Clark County Legal Services Program, where he specialized in Consumer Law. He helped found Consumers League of Southern Nevada. He was instrumental in establishing a Department of Consumer Affairs, by attending sessions of Nevada Assembly and urging legislators to pass the bill. The office of Consumer Affairs has fought against consumer price increases sought by various special interest groups.

Currently Leen is Juvenile Court deputy in Public Defender's Office. He is an outspoken advocate of improved counseling, employment and recreational services for Nevada youth. Tom Leen is a candidate for public office because, "too many elected officials are not

responsive of the needs of the average citizen, but are influenced by special interest groups."

Leen is for "anti-conflict of interest" legislation, utilization of federal funding for seniors programs, and increased training for police officers to better safeguard the public against crime.

Tom is a graduate of Brandeis University and Boston College Law School. A former Capt. in U. S. Air Force, awarded Bronze Star for service in Viet Nam.

BILL STAPP FOR ASSEMBLY, 14

Las Vegas Realtor Bill Stapp has jumped into the political ring to seek the Democratic nomination for the Assembly seat from District Two.

Stapp, 40, employe of Globe Realty, said, "Legislative reform will be a key issue in the next legislature and I believe I have the courage required to stand up to the 'special interest' lobbying efforts."

This will be Stapp's second attempt for this office. He lost the Democratic nomination in 1972 race to a Republican.

"I will again base my campaign on ending secrecy in government. The issue is just as valid this time as it was during the last campaign," he said.

He added, "I believe the full weight of the office of Assembly District Two should be applied to speed up the widening of West Charleston Boulevard out to Antelope Street. I consider the present traffic conditions the most hazardous in Las Vegas."
