### Here are Results

As the most hectic primary in Nevada history, with almost 300 candidates on the ballot, comes to a close, we are able to report the probable winners in many of the more prominent races.

We do this, as the column is being written Tuesday night, for the edification of those among our vast out-of-town readership who have been following the Nevada election through the ISRAELITE. At this late hour, with more than 50 percent of the votes in, there are still some undecided races, which could be determined before we have completed this piece.

In the contest for U. S. Senator, Lt. Gov. Harry Reid pulled away from an honest, earnest effort by Maya Miller to take the Democratic nomination. Reid will square off against former governor Paul Laxalt in the general election on November 5.

Jim Santini beat Myron Leavitt for the Democratic nomination for U. S. Representative and will face incumbent David Towell in the general.

Mike O'Callaghan was an easy victor to repeat on the Democratic slate for governor and he'll face Shirley Crumpler, the only woman Republican ever in the U.S. on the ballot for the top seat in any state.

In the Secretary of State docket, Bill Swackhamer will seek to retain his office against Republican Stanley Paher.

Attorney General Robert List, who was uncontested in the Republican primary will face a strong Richard Bryan on November 5.

For the Supreme Court, incumbent Chief Justice Gordan Thompson will compete with Charles Springer in the non-partisan contest.

In the State Senate, District No. 3, three Democrats, Mel Close, Ty Hilbrecht and Jack Schofield will square off against Chic Hecht, Phil Lampkin and Bill Yakey.

It looks like Bill Deiss, Democrat, against Zel Lohman in Assembly District 5, and Ruby Duncan coasting home with no Republican oppo-

### ISRAEL NEEDS GREATER WORLD JEWRY AID

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Jewish Agency Treasurer Leon Dulzin told 300 visiting American Jewish leaders that despite unprecedented post-Yom Kippur War contributions and the economic slumps in the U. S. and worldwide, Israel must appeal to Jewry abroad to give as much and more than last year.

Stressing the importance of absorbing new immigrants, especially from the Soviet Union, Dulzin said that despite Israel's economic burdens and social and security problems, no Jew in Israel or abroad could dare say or think "let's wait with Soviet Aliya."

Speaking to the 1974 United Jewish Appeal Prime Minister's Mission, Dulzin said the Yom Kippur War had cost Israel \$8 billion as compared to \$400 million for the Six Day

War and that this year's national budget was close to \$9 billion, of which around \$4 billion was for defense. He added that inflation was running at 40 percent, there was a \$3.5 billion trade deficit and taxes had been raised to "the highest imaginable level."

Earlier former Premier Golda Meir told the UJA group that Israel must resist any pressures by her American friends which would put the Jewish nation in a dangerous position. She warned Israel would go to war if the Arabs forced her to do so.

The UJA group, led by Paul Zuckerman, UJA general chairman, arrived in Israel just prior to a plane carrying 150 Soviet immigrants. The Americans welcomed the new immigrants

### EGYPT FORTIFIES SUEZ AREA

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- The Egyptian army has constructed more than 90 fortified strong points in the Sinai east of the Suez Canal, according to American intelligence sources.

The source said no attempt has been made as yet to link up the fortifications which are located along a north-south axis.

U. S. sources say that Israel's main defense in Sinai consists of three armored and two mechanized infantry brigades deployed along two key passes through a chain of hills about 20 miles from the canal.

The major Egyptian force of seven divisions

and four brigades of infantry is concentrated just west of the canal.

Egyptian President Anwar Sadat in a speech in Alexandria said that new war planes are on their way to Egypt, bought by "some friendly Arab states" to replace Egypt's Yom Kippur War losses. He said that Egypt was saved from near bankruptcy on the eve of the war by \$500 million received from "our Arab brothers."

### ISRAEL'S MOBILIZATION TEST A SUCCESS

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Israel's mass mobilization test was termed a success.

Defense Minister Shimon Peres decided to shorten the exercise from the planned 24 hours in view of the excellent response by reservists. Chief of Staff Gen. Mordechai Gur, also calling the exercise a success, said many units had 100 percent of their men report while others neared the goal. He praised the public for helping spread the news of the callup and assisting those called up to reach their posts.
