

Israeli Premier Yitzhak Rabin recently noted that the peace Arab leaders talk about in their visits abroad is not the kind Israel can accept, Nor are Arab words of peace matched by their actions.

Egyptian President Anwar Sadat has declared that the war with Israel is not yet over -although at the same time he told students in Alexandria that Egypt won the war with Israel last October. Sadat is attempting to build a unified front against Israel which would include terrorist Palestine Liberation Organization as well as Jordan. He has boasted of new war planes coming to Egypt bought by "some friendly Arab states." The announcement by France that she is lifting her embargo against selling arms to Mideast combatants will also help Egypt since she will no longer have to resort to subterfuge to receive the French weapons through Libya.

Meanwhile Egypt, according to American intelligence, has built a series of more than 90 fortified strongpoints in the Sinai east of the Suez Canal. Syria is being rearmed heavily enough by the Soviet Union to seriously worry Israel about the possibility of a new war by the end of the year. And what is one to make of the strange maneuverings by Soviet minesweepers penetrating into Israeli-controlled waters and even in one bizarre incident dousing Israeli boats and men with water hoses?

Capping all this is Arab insistence in Washington and elsewhere that the next step in the Middle East process must be further Israeli withdrawals. Israel cannot and will not accept this one-sided argument. It will remain to be seen what will emerge from all this when Rabin comes to Washington this month.

When, on Charles Lindbergh's death, the spotlight fell on Minnesota, birthplace of that hero, it reminded me of how close this country was to having a president (Hubert Humphrey) from that state.

Who knows whether HHH will try again? But while thinking of Minnesota, it occured to me that all of us are indebted to that state for many accomplishments by Jews.

I don't know how many rabbis and Jewish scholars have Minnesota connections, but I do know that one man, the late Dr. George Gordon was a model Jew and that he inspired hundred of people to love and know Judaism more than they otherwise would.

Leader of that city's Talmud Torah, Dr. Gordon counted at least three notable Gordons among American Jewish leaders: Dr. Cyrus Gordon, the gifted Biblical savant and archeologist (now of Brandeis U.), Rabbi Harold Gordon, executive chief of the world's largest rabbinic association (New York Board of Rabbis), and Rabbi Theodore Herzl Gordon, now retired from his suburban Philadelphia congregation after a long and fruitful ministry.

Rabbi Albert Minda (once head of the Central Conference of American Rabbis) is but one spiritual leader of the area who has had long careers in Minneapolis pulpits. Of course, if you talk Minneapolis, you must include its twin city, St. Paul. There's an old anecdote
