

RABIN'S AMERICAN VISIT TO STRESS AID

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Premier Yitzhak Rabin, on the eve of his trip to Washington, has told the Cabinet he will press the United States for progress on the bilateral agreements made during former President Nixon's visit to Israel.

Rabin said this meant military supplies and the economic assistance to pay for them as well as general economic aid. There has been some concern here at the relatively slow pace at which the undertakings made during Nixon's visit have been translated into action.

The Cabinet debated the diplomatic options the diplomatic options facing Israel but no decision was made, at

Rabin's request, until his return from Washington. By then he should have a fuller picture of how the Americans and their recent Arab guests see the future of peace efforts in the Middle East.

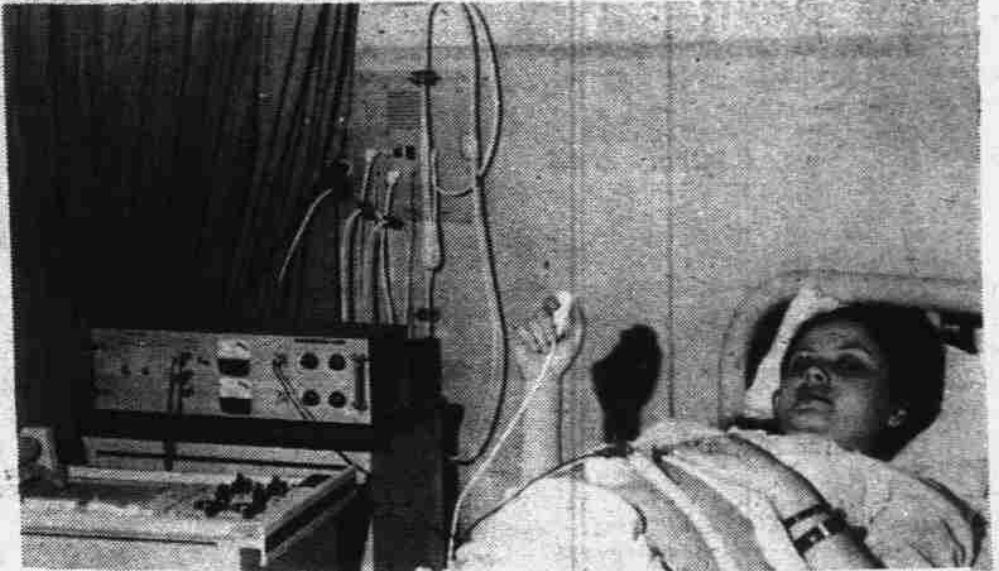
Foreign Minister Yigal Allon briefed the Cabinet on the meetings U. S. Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger has held with Israeli and Arab leaders.

Meanwhile in Washington, the Ford Administration is planning a red carpet treatment for Rabin, who will be coming to the United States for the first time since he left the post of Israeli Ambassador in

Washington 18 months ago.

During his four-day visit he will be President Ford's guest at Blair House. Rabin is scheduled to be welcomed at the White House by Ford and he and his wife will be guests of honor at a dinner at the White House. Israeli Ambassador Simcha Dinitz is also scheduled to hold a garden party for the Rabins. Rabin will hold at least one full meeting with Ford and several with Kissinger.

Rabin is also scheduled to address the regular quarterly meeting of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds before returning to Israel. The talk to some 300 American Jewish leaders at the meeting, which will also include leaders of the United Jewish Appeal, will be his only

UPTURN IN U.S. ECONOMY WILL AID ISRAEL

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Max Fisher, chairman of the Jewish Agency's Board of Governors, has predicted that there will be an upturn in the U.S. economy which will enable some big American donors to redeem their pledges to the United Jewish Appeal thereby easing the Jewish Agency's present cash crisis.

Jewish Agency Treasurer Leon Dulzin has reported that this year's budget is \$200 million short, largely due to the world economy slump which has slowed down the flow of cash from persons who had made pledges.

Fisher said while the immediate cash needs were imperative and

required urgent attention there should be no slackening of UJA efforts to obtain pledges for the 1975 campaign. He said the large donors, once having overcome their temporary financial setbacks will fulfill both their old pledges and their new ones.

Fisher said he was confident that President Ford, an old friend of his, would restore "buoyancy" to the American economy within a period of months. Fisher said the UJA hopes to raise as much or more money as in last year's record-breaking post-Yom Kippur War effort. He said some 2000 American Jewish leaders will come to Israel in October and November,
