

Jews "Down Under"

life will never be the same, Traditionally supporters of the Labor Party, the Jews of Australia were shaken when the Prime Minister, Laborite Gough Whitlam, embarked upon a course calculated to make Australia the leader of the Far Eastern bloc, or of the Third World -- a course which has led him to an anti-American and anti-Israel One straw in the wind was his susstance. pension of negotiations between El Al and Qantas, the Australian airline. He was even more direct at a meeting with about 100 Jewish leaders, all long-time supporters of Labor, whom he hurt deeply by saying "you people are never satisfied."

In the recent elections, some two-thirds of the Jewish vote went to the Liberal Party nominee, Bill Snedden, who has not been vocal at all on the Israel issue. Whitlam was able to win most of the newly-enfranchised youth by promising increased budgetary allocations for education and other youth programs.

Many Australian Jews have close ties to Israel, with relatives living there and about 500 making aliyah annually. Because of these ties, the Jews of Australia were able to raise an additional \$13 million in the wake of the Yom Kippur War, over and above the regular campaign income of \$3 million, and they are determined to maintain this level of giving even though their contributions are not taxdeductible.

There are about one thousand Israelis living in Australia, and about two hundred thousand people of Arab descent, half from Lebanon, who supported Whitham in his campaign for reelection not only with significant funds but with a reelection campaign of their own.

Unfortunately, the Jewish community of Australia is not geared to political activity, since there has not been any need for it in the past, Australian policy having always been strongly pro-Israel. As a result of the new direction taken by the Whitlam government, however, the Jews of Australia have had to take a new look at themselves and their organizational structure and are beginning to plan for such activity in the future.

During the Maalot crisis, for example, the adult Jewish community was completely immobilized except for memorial services in the synagogues; it was only the students who were flexible enough to be able to go into action and conducted memorial meetings on campus for the Maalot victims. They had also succeeded, after tremendous effort, in blocking an earlier pro-Arab resolution that was being lobbled for among the university students.
