AJC OFFERS SPECIFIC SUGGESTIONS ON MEASURES TO COMBAT INFLATION

RESOLVE CONFLICTS WITHOUT WAR

UNITED NATIONS (WNS) -- "The urgent political responsibility of our era is to resolve conflicts without war," Secretary of State Heary A. Kissinger told the 29th annual session of the General Assembly.

He told the 138 member-nations that it was in the common interest of each of them "that local conflicts can be resolved short of force and their root causes removed by political means." However, Kissinger warned against "attempts to resolve all issues at one time" noting that "exaggerated expectations will prevent essential accommodations among the parties."

He noted that the Middle East "starkly demonstrates these considerations." Kissinger offered no new observations on the Mideast but warned that while "we have achieved the respite of a cease-fire and of two disengagement agreements... the shadow of war remains." He said it was the "solemn responsibility" of the UN members "to encourage and support the parties in the Middle East on their present course" towards peace.

Kissinger said President Ford asked him to "reaffirm" that the U.S. will continue the effort made during the last year to promote a Mideast peace.

Kissinger spoke at length about the oil problem and attributed the high cost of oil to "deliberate decisions to restrict production and maintain an artificial price level."

The Jewish Agency aliya and absorption department plans to prepare for an expected immigration of 100,000 Soviet Jews a year as a result of the agreement between the United States and the Soviet Union expected to be concluded soon.

Moshe Rivlin, the Agéncy's director general, told a press conference in Haifa that while 130,000 Soviet Jews have applied for exit visas, many tens of thousands more are expected to apply once the USSR reverses its policy of persecuting and harassing Jews seeking to leave.

Rivlin said that by the end of 1975 there will be 27,000 apartment units for the new immigrants and an effort will be made to increase construction for immigrants in the years to come.

LOSS PARKETS

WASHINGTON..., Warning that the current economic situation could "exacerbate intergroup conflicts, provide inflammable tinder for scapegoating, and pit race, ethnic and class groups against each other," the President of the American Jewish Committee urged the White House Summit Conference on Inflation to "protect those groups in our society which are now threatened with particular hardship."

Elmer L. Winter told the delegates attending the preliminary conference, conducted by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, that "concern for the poor and the disadvantaged deserves priority attention, but we dare not ignore the problems of all Americans whose standards of living are being threatened, whose life savings are being eroded, and whose confidence in the future is badly shaken. Social progress requires the restoration of general economic health and growth. Time Is of the essence."

Mr. Winter specifically urged President Ford to establish a Commission on Government Priorities to develop a long-range plan for the nation's needs and the revenues to support such needs.

He cautioned, however, that "in any proposed budget cuts or modifications, the poor and members of minority groups should not be adversely affected."

"If maintaining the necessary levels of federal expenditures for social programs requires reduction in defense expenditures or an increase in revenues through tax reform, such measures should be given careful consideration," he said.

Mr. Winter also offered a series of specific suggestions on measures to meet the prospects of continuing and increasing unemployment. They were:

 Minimize the impact of increased unemployment through employment in the public sector;

Esperanto World All-Cure

No more wars.

An end to world poverty.

Stoppage of international crime.

All this is possible by the simple means of communication, a universal language. Such is the belief, the dream, the hope of some 8,000,000 adherants of **ESPERANTO**, a simplified, regular language with Latin-type grammar and European vocabulary. It was created 100 years ago by L.L. Zamenhof.

Now comes an energetic young Canadian. Bernie Quinn, who is determined to inervate ESPERANTO into world-wide acceptance as the first step towards the creation of the idealistic state. The setting for the kick-off would be the 1976 Olympic Games in Montreal, where 8,000 top athletes from 130 different countries will compete for world championships.

According to Quinn, a new group is being formed called, Language Organization Voicing Esperanto |LOVE|, with headquarters in Montreal. Two hotels are available, with 800 rooms, 16 gymnasiums, indoor pools, tennis courts and theatres. The headquarters will serve as a meeting grounds for a world congress of present members of ESPERANTO and a haven for visiting athletes, who want to know more about a universal language.

The athletes, with individual philosophies, varied modes of manner and dress, and different methods of speech, will be in close proximity of each other for more than two months. A means of universal communication would greatly enhance the ability to understand and know each other.

It is Quinn's goal for each one of the athletes to be gifted with a closed circuit television set and a video camera. The camera will enable each contestant to film active portrayal of his own performance to detect flaws and increase form and style. These could be viewed on his own, private tv set. In addition, film cartridges would be supplied, showing the former gold winner of the individual event performing his world championship ability. This will enable the Montreal contestant to compare and possibly improve his own efforts. The cartridges of the world champion will be voiced in ESPERANTO, with sub titles in the athlete's own language. This will be the first break of the speech barrier and will enable each viewer to learn ESPERANTO phonetically.

But Olympic athletes are amateurs and may not accept gifts or gratuities. Quinn has the answer.

Scholarships from LOVE will be granted to each contestant. The scholarship will be in the form of an
