UNITED NATIONS (WNS) -- Israeli Foreign Minister Yigal Allon told the General Assembly that there is no problem in the Arab-Israeli dispute, "including the question of the independent identity of the Palestinians, which cannot be solved by sincere negotiations between the

He asserted that none of the problems "can be solved by war."

Allon, who is also Israel's Deputy Premier. spoke in Hebrew, the first time the General Assembly has been addressed in that language. Making his first appearance before the UN body, Allon made it clear that if conditions are

not yet ripe "for a final peace settlement Israel is prepared to examine the possibilities of reaching interim agreements ... providing for effective mutual security arrangements that, in the course of time will lead to negotiations for a peace treaty which will determine, inter alia, the final borders."

Allon said Israel recognizes the existence of "the question of a Palestinian identity" but believes it can be solved in the context of a settlement with Jordan since the great majority of Palestinians live on both sides of the Jordan River and most Palestinians hold Jordanian citizenship. He declared that "The Palestine community in general must in no way equated with the terror organizations."

He described the Palestine Liberation Organ-ization (PLO) as "not a national liberation movement but the roof organization of united and splintered terrorist groups whose pretensions and support do not spring from the broad masses of the Palestinian people." Conceding that the General Assembly may grant the PLO official recognition, he said Israel
