

JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Former Israeli President Zalman Shazar was reported in serious condition at Hadassah Hospital.

UNITED NATIONS (WNS) -- The 30-member Arab League has drafted a resolution to invite the Palestine Liberation Organization to address the General Assembly in November.

ROME (WNS) -- Patriarch Melchite-Maximus V, head of the Greek Catholic Church, asked the Synod of Bishops meeting in the Vatican not to condemn Archbishop Hillarion Capucci, head of the Greek Catholic Church in East Jerusalem and the West Bank, for the charges against him by Israel of smuggling arms and ammunition for Arab terrorists.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- The rising wave of terrorist activities brought about a special Cabinet meeting to discuss the situation.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- The Senate by a 46-33 vote rejected a proposal by Sen. Frank Church (D, Idaho) to cut off American aid to oil producing nations that refuse to cooperate in lowering oil prices.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Leaders of Moked, the leftwing Knesset faction, and the militant Orthodox Emunim bloc, have agreed it is better to discuss their differences than settle them in street brawls.

BUENOS AIRES (WNS) -- The Latin American Jewish Congress has urged Jewish leaders in Latin America to help the people of Honduras in the wake of Hurricane Fifi which claimed the lives of some 7500 persons and left 50,000 homeless and to cooperate with local committees set up to aid Honduras.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Dr. Mikhail Stern, a Jewish doctor in Vinnitsa in the Ukraine, has been charged with "attempting poisoning of children," according to the Student Struggle for Soviet Jewry.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- In a demonstration urging the Syrian government to end the "persecution, repression and deprivation of Syrian Jews" and to permit them to emigrate, some 70 persons stood behind a symbolic prison fence at the Isaiah Wall facing the United Nations.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- A road in southern Lebanon, parallel to the Israel border, was seized by Israeli troops who were stopping and searching vehicles for arms and explosives.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Terrorist activities in Israel took the life of an Israeli army officer and an Arab bus passenger.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- The Cabinet has approved the appointment of Res. Gen. Rehavam Zeevi as special advisor to Premier Yitzhak Rabin, a post in which he is expected to lead Israel's efforts against terrorism.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- An offer by Premier Yitzhak Rabin that the National Religious Party join his coalition government without preconditions is reportedly being considered by the NRP.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- Congressmen who have reduced military aid to South Vietnam to \$700 million while earlier approving \$2.2 billion for Israel after the Yom Kippur War, have been criticized by Defense Secretary James Schlesinger.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Premier Yitzhak Rabin said he has his own detailed maps for either an overall peace with the Arab states or for interim settlement.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Police have reported more than a dozen cases of burglary in Jerusalem and a lesser number in Tel Aviv, all committed while the householders were attending Yom Kippur services.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- Warsaw's last remaining synagogue will be renovated by the Polish government, according to B'nai B'rith president David Blumberg.

EBAN FAVORS ALL FORMS OF JUDAISM

CINCINNATI (WNS) -- Israel must recognize the plurality and diversity of Jewish religious experience and reject any formula that would discriminate against "all the recognized currents of faith in Judaism," former Israeli Foreign Minister Abba Eban told the 150th anniversary celebration of the Rockdale Temple here. Eban, a member of the Knesset, said the "Israeli people must come to terms with the pluralism and diversity of the Jewish religious experience." He said he hoped that in his Labor Party and in other parties "there are those who would stand firm against any measures which would cast doubts on the sanctity of rabbinic actions, whether Orthodox Conservative or Reform." Eban in his talk did not directly mention the proposed compromise in Israel.

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NEW YORK -- One year after the Yom Kippur War, more than 200 American Jewish leaders from communities across the United States will visit Israel October 14-21, as participants in the 1975 United Jewish Appeal Study Conference.

WASHINGTON -- Recent actions by the B'nai B'rith Hillel Commission have confirmed the assignment of thirteen new Hillel directors.

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
