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KISSINGER'S 8TH MIDEAST MISSION COMPLICATED, WITH GREATER RISKS

SHAZAR, ISRAEL'S 3RD PRES., DEAD AT 84

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Shmuel Zalman Shazar, who retired last year as Israel's third President, died a day before his 85th birthday.

Thousands of Israelis, officials and ordinary citizens, streamed by as his body lay in state at the Binyanei HaOom (Convention Hall) before burial in "The President's Plot" on Mt. Herzl.

Shazar, who served 10 years as Israel's President, was taken to Hadassah Hospital a week before his death. He had suffered a heart attack last May. During the week he was hospitalized he was unconscious part of (Continued on Page 3)

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger left for his eighth and what many observers believe to be his most difficult trip to the Middle East.

He told a press conference here that "no concrete results in the forms of agreements or dramatic announcements can be expected from this trip." He said that the most that could be achieved is "concreteness on the negotiating process and perhaps to agree on some timing."

Kissinger told a delegation of 15 American Jewish leaders that as talks progress in the Mideast, the situation becomes more and more complicated and the risks are greater. According to Rabbi Israel Miller, chairman of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations, Kissinger said he plans to discuss with Israeli Premier Yitzhak Rabin an agreement on procedure for the next step in negotiations, a possible time-table and the outline of what Israel will agree upon.

In Tel Aviv, Israeli Foreign Minister Yigal Allon, just back from the United Nations where he met with Kissinger, said that Israel was hopeful that Kissinger's mission would succeed. He said the American official's purpose in going to the Mideast was to find a common denominator on which the parties could agree so that negotiations could be resumed.

Kissinger's itinerary includes visits to Egypt, Syria, Jordan, Israel, Saudi Arabia, Algeria and Morocco. Kissinger added the last two countries apparently because of the oil crisis.

However, he told the press conference that he disliked the term "oil crisis" and believes that "higher oil prices" and the Arab-Israeli conflict "should be in separate forums" and "we are conducting them in separate forums."

NO PEPSI PLEASE

Over 400 members of the "Pepsi generation" at the University of South Florida in Tampa have signed a pledge that they "cannot in good conscience buy Pepsico products while hundreds of thousands of Russian Jews are kept in slavery in the USSR," according to the Student Struggle for Soviet Jewry.

The "No Pepsi, please" drive was conducted by the USF Jewish Student Union, SSSJ said, and the signers are of all faiths. Each student recorded his signature and social security number on a

form which was forwarded to Donald Kendall, Pepsico's board chairman, who has personally spearheaded a drive in the business community to stop the Jackson Amendment in Congress.

Mr. Kendall was urged by the students to "direct all your energies and resources in the Soviet Union and here in the U.S. to bring a speedy solution to this problem so that we may again enjoy Pepsico products. Free people before free trade!"

MASSIVE EFFORT TO SETTLE WEST BANK

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Thousands of Israelis have been participating in the most massive effort yet to plant settlements on the West Bank in defiance of government policy and regulations.

The Army has been attempting to thwart efforts although after two days several hundred squatters were still at large east of

the "Green Line." The mass trek began at the end of Succoth when between 1000-5000 persons participated in the obviously well-planned, coordinated movement.

The effort was sponsored by the so-called Gush Emonin (Bloc of the Faithful) made up chiefly of Orthodox zealots who claim that all of the Holy Land west of the Jordan belongs to Israel by Divine right. But they are being supported by Likud, the National Religious Party and the Greater Israel Movement.

The organizers freely admitted that the mass effort was designed to coincide with Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger's visit to the Middle East.

Premier Yitzhak Rabin said the unauthorized settlement would not be tolerated. He said that the government had settlement priorities and urged the would-be settlers to go to areas where settlements are needed.
