PLO RECOGNIZED AT U.N.

Assembly voted 105-4 to recognize the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) and invite it to participate in the debate on the Palestine question scheduled to be held after the U.S. general elections in November.

The United States, Israel, the Dominican Republic and Bolivia voted against the resolution while Canada, Britain, Germany, the Netherlands, were among the 20 members obstaining. Among those voting in favor were France, Italy and Jordan.

Israeli Ambassador Yosef Tekoah told re-porters after the vote: "This marks the surrender of the UN to murder and barbarism. Israel will have no part in this surrender."
But he said Israel will continue to seek peace in the Middle East.

Before the vote, Tekoah warned the Assembly that recognition of the PLO would threaten the diplomatic process toward a solution of the Mideast conflict, encourage international terrorism and make "a mockery of the United Nations and of its Charter.'

U. S. Ambassador John Scali explaining the U.S. vote stressed that the U.S. is seeking a peace that is just for all parties in the Mideast which "must be negotiated with utmost care and must lead to an overall settlement of the Arab-Israeli conflict, at the heart of which we recognize lies the Palestinian problem."

The Arab delegations and their allies were jubilant. Two PLO representatives are already in New York, Sadat Hasan and Dr. Nabeel Shaath. Shortly after the vote, Shaath pressed by reporters for the PLO's aims, declared "the PLO is going to act responsibly from now on the property of the PLO is going to act responsibly from now on the property of the property but declared that violence would be continued inside Israel to 'liberate our homeland.'''

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
