

RICHARD BRYAN FOR ATTY. GEN.

Reno City Attorney Bob Van Wagoner, candidate for attorney general in the recent Democratic primary election, threw his full support to State Senator Richard Bryan and announced formation of a statewide committee to "expose the many failures of the present Republican attorney general, Robert List."

At the same time he was announcing his "full and unqualified" support for Bryan, Van Wagoner said List "apparently is trying to buy his way back into office through outrageous spending which should be questioned by every thinking Nevadan."

Van Wagoner said the incumbent Republican attorney general "did not even face primary election opposition, but spent more money on media than Senator Bryan and I combined. This type of extravagant spending by an

unopposed candidate should make everyone wonder if List is trying to purchase office."

Van Wagoner said Bryan "has the background, legal knowledge, experience and dedication to public service to be a great attorney general."

"Bryan has demonstrated great courage and leadership during six years as an assemblyman and state senator, and during his service as a prosecutor and Nevada's first public defender. He was a worthy opponent and a gentleman to whom I have pledged my full and unqualified support."

Van Wagoner said he is "proud and grateful that 28,000 of my fellow Democrats supported me with their votes in the primary election."

Bryan said he was "pleased and honored that a person of Bob Van Wagoner's integrity and leadership would take such an active role

POLITICAL HOPEFULS

TY HILBRECHT FOR STATE SENATE

Ty Hilbrecht, Democratic candidate for state senate, and former Nevada legislator, has proposed sweeping legislative reforms to police conflicts of interests by state lawmakers.

Hilbrecht noted that present law only refers to a conflict of interest when officeholders enter into a contract with a state agency.

The Hilbrecht proposal would make it a crime for lawmakers to vote on items where a conflict existed. A conflict would be defined in much the same way present law defines those cases where a judge may not sit. Such a law would prohibit any official participating in a vote in which he, his family, associates, or clients, would have a financial interest.

In 1971 while an Assemblyman, Ty Hilbrecht, as a member of the Ways and Means Committee, worked for a new school funding formula that gave Clark County \$4,000,000 additional money for schools.

"During this campaign I have heard Nevadans complain too often about appearing before a legislative body only to find that the members voting have a direct or indirect interest," Hilbrecht charged. "Only making such activity a crime will assure that these abuses will not recur," he said.

Other features of the legislative package urged by Hilbrecht include:

1. A law to assure open meetings of all legislative hearings and committee discussion of all public matters.

2. Measures requiring all state candidates to disclose the names of substantial campaign contributors. Present law does not compel disclosure of campaign financing sources, or even



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the amounts contributed. Only expenses must be reported.

3. A rule that Assembly and Senate hearings on the same bill be consolidated to assure full public participation in the decision-making process. Often, spokesmen for interested citizen groups are not notified of the hearings, which are usually held separately by each legislative body.

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HARRY REID FOR U.S. SENATE

Lt. Gov. Harry Reid applauded the U. S. Senate for its vote to override President Ford's recent decision to delay for three months a 5.5 percent pay hike for federal employees. The raise will now go through October 1.

Ford, at the time, said the stall was to help combat inflation. He said the delay would save \$700 million in the current fiscal year. Reid noted that 12,000 Nevadans would be affected by the delay, and spoke out sharply against the President's decision. "This would have created a severe hardship on those families with Christmas approaching." The Senate vote was 64-33.
