

ZEL LOWMAN FOR ASSEMBLY

Assemblyman Zel Lowman, four-term veteran of the Lower House of the Nevada Legislature, has filed to run for re-election to the 1975 Legislature.

The local and business community leader has served as majority floor leader, chairman of transportation, vice chairman of both Judiciary and Environment & Public Resources. In addition he has been a member of Education, Building & Construction and Mining Committees and is currently vice chairman of the bipartisan Legislative Commission which does legislative work between sessions.

Well known for his youth work in Southern Nevada, Lowman was presented earlier this year with a Kiwanis District Governors Award and a Youth for Community Pride plaque for outstanding service. He and Mrs. Lowman were given the Mr. & Mrs. Award of the Las Vegas Eagles Lodge in 1973 for "building sound homes and stable family life." He holds the Silver Beaver from Boy Scouts and Girl Scouting's Thanks Badge.

One of the prime movers on dangerous drug legislation in Nevada, Lowman has chaired a study committee on the problem and he also works in the treatment and rehabilitation area. He is vice president of the Southern Nevada Drug Abuse

Council, president of Nevada Family and of Fitzsimmons Halfway House and past president of Operation Bridge. He has also been a member of the Las Vegas Civil Service Board, Solicitations Review Board and currently serves on the Youth Advisory Board.

Lowman was author or co-sponsor of 52 measures which were passed by the 1973 Legislature. His major bills were to cut the revolving door criminal problem, by establishing a work-release program at the Nevada State Prison, to set the age of majority at 18, to regulate fly-by-night debt adjusters and to encourage law school and educational doctoral programs at UNLV.

POLITICAL HOPEFULS

PAUL LAXALT FOR U.S. SENATE

Claiming that "The Arabs have us on the ropes," U. S. Senate candidate Paul Laxalt called today for a common sense compromise between the environmentalists and the nation's vital needs.

Laxalt said: "Make no mistake about it. The oil nations will continue to hold back their output, keeping prices up and us on edge. Nevada, perhaps more than any other state, will be seriously hurt because tourism is our lifeline."

Former Governor Laxalt outlined an energy program he would propose as U.S. Senator. It calls for:

- (1) - A compromise promise between environmentalists - and industry, each giving ground for the common good.
- (2) Stockpiling of a year's supply of oil, guarding against another sudden cutoff.
- (3) Development of "every alternative energy source available to us," solar and nuclear energy and the 300-year supply of coal within the continental limits of the United States.
- (4) Removal of the depletion allowance. "The Oil industry is well enough off with

retained earnings to finance exploration and development of energy sources," he said.

RALPH MOSA FOR COUNTY COMMISSION

Ralph Mosa, Democratic nominee for the County Commission, District "F", has challenged his Republican incumbent opponent, Tom Wiesner, to stand up and be proud of his Republican party affiliation.

Mosa pointed out that Wiesner had failed to put Republican on his signs, brochures, billboards, and in his radio and television commercials.

Mosa further chided Wiesner on his recent brochure which he (Wiesner) sent to the voters in his district that not only failed to state that he was a Republican, but that he had photographs in that brochure of himself with Democrats Senator Howard Cannon, Governor Mike O'Callaghan, and

fellow Commissioner Jack Petitti, which would naturally lead one to believe Wiesner is a Democrat.

Democrat Mosa declared he is not ashamed of the rank and file members of the Republican party.

"In fact, I am receiving the support of many of the registered Republicans in my district," Mosa said. "I strongly believe in the two-party system in this country, and the rank and file Republicans are certainly not to blame for the recent Watergate scandal in Washington."
