KISSINGER ONLY HOPE TO AVERT MIDEAST WAR, IF TALKS RESUME

PLO SOLE PALESTINEAN AGENT

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- The decision by the Arab summit conference at Rabat, Morocco, recognizing the Palestine Liberation Organization as the "sole representative of the Palestinian people" will be studied by the Israeli government before it takes an official position, Premier Yitzhak Rabin told the Knesset.

But he admitted the news from Rabat "did not look good." Unofficial reactions by Israelis were gloomy as they saw the Arab summit decision as a stunning victory for the PLO over King Hussein of Jordan, who has now agreed to PLO control of the West Bank if it is given up by the Israelis.

"The general feeling here is that the decision is bad -- bad for hopes of peaceful progress," one highly-placed observer said. Defense Minister Shimon Peres told Hebrew University students that the Arab summit essentially adopted the PLO view on the West Bank. Noting that Israelis were divided over the future of the occupied areas, Peres said that "the PLO proposes neither territorial

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- The Israeli Cabinet is waiting for Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger to return to Israel before reaching a final conclusion on the possible consequences of the Arab summit conference in Rabat.

In a joint communique at the close of Kissinger's visit to Iran, the Shah of Iran and Kissinger "reaffirmed the determination of the United States to press its efforts to help maintain the momentum of the negotiations begun earlier this year" in the Middle East. Israeli officials believe that Kissinger will make a major effort to salvage the dimming prospects of further Arab-Israeli talks.

The Cabinet, which discussed the Rabat conference at its latest meeting, is reportedly eager to learn what secret resolutions may have been adopted by the Arab leaders. Officials here believe that Israeli-Jordanian talks may have been ruled out for the foreseeable future by the Rabat decision to recognize the Palestine Liberation Organization as the sole legitimate representative of the Palestinian people. But Israelis expect Kissinger to press for Egyptian-Israeli talks next even though Syria and the PLO are exerting pressure on Egyptian President Anwar Sadat not to go into another round of separate negotiations with Israel.

Meanwhile Yasir Abed Rabbo, chief of the PLO's information office in Beirut, has declared that the Arab leaders in Rabat rejected Kissinger's approach. He called on the Arab states to prepare themselves militarily and economically for a new war with Israel.

In Tel Aviv, Premier Yitzhak Rabin told a meeting of the Israel Management Center

Two incumbent Justices of Peace, Mahlon Brown and Robert Legakes will remain at their posts.
