UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (WNS) -- Yasir Arafat, the head of the Palestine Liberation Organization, clearly spelled out the PLO intention in the opening debate on Palestine in the United Nations General Assembly when he said his organization seeks a democratic secular Palestine state, a euphemism for the dismantling

In his appearance before the U.N. he told that body that he had come there "bearing an olive branch and a freedom fighters gun. Do not let the olive branch drop from my hand."

The olive branch in effect was the gun that was pointing directly at Israel. Arafat was hard and uncompromising and he repeatedly voiced a threatening call for the dismantling of Israel.

In an expression of outrage at the parliamentary maneuvering of the U.N. General Assembly President Abdelaziz Bouteflika of Algeria who postponed the session a few hours to dramatize Arafat's appearance, the Israeli delegation boycotted the session which Arafat addressed. But after the Arab terrorist's speech, Israel Ambassador Yosef Tekoah declared that "today, bloodshed and bestiality have come here to collect the spoils of the United Nations' surrender."
