

Rosen did not dispute that figure. He said the problem of the immigration fall-off and of departure of the immigrants from Israel depended as much on the settled population as on the newcomers. He urged "a rise in public morale and education toward love of homeland and Zionism without condition." Rosen said that since' his ministry was established in 1968. 250,000 olim had arrived in Israel and 220,000 had remained there. ISRAELITE ADS PAY

Arafat, Head of the Palestine Liberation Organization, told the General Assembly that he came to the United Nations carrying a "free-dom fighter's gun."

This week the guns of his "freedom fighters" spewed forth death and violence. In a pre-dawn raid on an apariment house in Beisan, three terrorists killed four Israeli civilians and 20 more Israelis were injured leaping out of windows or hit by bullets from the terrorists' guns. The terrorists were killed by Israeli security forces.

Information Minister Aharon Yariv said the terrorists came from Jordan. Their tracks had been found at the Jordan River, only three miles east of Beisan.

There was no question in the minds of Israeli officials and many in Europe and the U.S. that the Beisan atrocity had been given the goahead by the Palestinian Liberation Organiza-

The attack came only six days after Arafat told the Assembly that Israel must be replaced by a democratic secular state, a euphemism for the dismantling of Israel. Yosef Tekoah, Israel's Ambassador to the UN, states that the attack was Arafat's "repayment to the United Nations" for having invited him to speak there.

Condemnations of the new atrocity were also made by UN Secretary General Kurt Waldheim and the State Department. But Shafik Al-Hout, the PLO's chief spokesman at the UN, hailed the assault as the "kind of negotiations (with Israel) we accept." The terrorist spokesman added that Israel had said that it would meet the Palestinians only on the battlefield. "So we meet them on the battlefield," he said,

"One Man Plus The Truth Constitutes A Majority" BY JACK TELL

Because the response to last week's column asking Howard Hughes to return to Las Vegas, was so overwhelming, we decided to write a follow-up with concrete specifics to support our view.

Hughes Follow-Up

While most callers congratulated and agreed with us, some 15 or 20, just about 10 percent, were skeptic. They didn't care much one way or another, but what exactly, they asked, did Howard Hughes do for them? In every case, without exception, after we gave them some details of the Frontier and Landmark acquisitions, they agreed whole heartedly that Hughes in Nevada was a definite asset.

We did not even attempt to convince the doubters of the Hughes effect on the general economy. After all, although we knew beyond any shadow that his arrival caused the upsweep, it still was a personal opinion open to argument, We didn't even re-hash his general contributions, like the medical school and community college, the Boy Scouts, and all the others. We confined our response to the bare facts of the circumstances surrounding the Frontier and Landmark hotels. That clinched our cause. Here's what we said:

First of all, we confessed we know only what we had read in the newspapers and heard on the news programs. We have no hidden pipeline to innermost secrets in the Hughes organization files, or any insight into the mind and thoughts of Mr. Hughes. All we know is what actually happened. Its all a matter of record.

The Frontier was purchased by Hughes in the wee a.m. hours. A party line phone call was arranged to a majority of State Gaming Commissioners, who consented to the sale at the wierd, early morning hour. Hughes representatives, within minutes, took over the cashier's cage, the gaming pits and the operation of the hotel. Not a single salaried employee was removed from the payroll. And there was good reason for the sudden, swift turnover.

Hidden, hard-boy interests running the Frontier, were bleeding the operation blind. It was doubtful it could have lasted even another single day. The joint was ready to fold, Des-pite this, every partner, including those with clandestine investments, was paid off in full with a handsome profit. They were tickled to death to get out from under at the time, and they took off in a hurry. - Many would still be running if they were not indicted, convicted and sentenced in a Los Angeles federal courtroom.
