Force. Before leaving Israel for Cairo, he the Security cabled Council that both sides had agreed to a six months extension of the UNDOF mandate.

But Israel maintains its state of alert on the Golan Heights until the Security Council formally approves extension. Syria had. withheld its approval of extension until Waldheim met with its leaders in Damascus,

Waldheim told newsmen in Israel that President Hafez Assad told him "Syria does not want war." He said Syria wants a political settlement but they cannot wait forever to get a poli-tical settlement," During his visit to Jerusalem, Waldheim met with Premier Yitzhak Rabin, Foreign Minister Yigal Illon and Defense Minister Shimon Peres.

Israel, meanwhile, is concerned about the evacuation by the Austrian UNDOF contingent of the 9000 - foot Mt. Hermon peak which is unhabitable during winter. Israelis are concerned that Syrian forces can now reach the peak by way of a road built in violation of the disengagement agreement.

Hanukkah at U.S. Bases

NEW YORK -- The lights of Hanukkah will glow at U. S. military installations all over the globe for American Jewish servicemen and their families during Hanukkah celebrations made possible by the National Jewish Welfare Board (JWB).

Festivities begin at sundown, December 8, when the first candle of the Hanukkan menorah will be kindled. Jewish chaplains and Jewish military lay leaders, endorsed and served by the JWB Commission on Jewish Chaplaincy, will conduct holiday observances for their military congregations and for Jewish patients in Veterans Administration hospitals.

Throughout the eight days of the holiday, children of U.S. servicemen will be playing with dreidles (Hanukkah tops) and unwrapping gifts such as Hanukkah gelt and other special holiday surprises sent by the JWB Women's Organizations' Services. Decorations, menorahs, candles and refreshments are also supplied

Arab Baloney

Why are all the crocodile tears being shed about giving back to the poor Arabs the land they need so desperately?
