WASHINGTON (WNS) -- A bi-partisan group of 71 senators, representing nearly three-quarters of the Senate, has written a letter to President Ford urging him to reaffirm Ameri-can commitment to the survival and integrity of Israel and to mobilize the allies of the United States toward returning the United Nations to the principles of its charter.

The senators declared they were "deeply disturbed by the UN vote to give recognition to the Palestine Liberation Organization and by the spectacle of Western cynicism, apathy and disunity." They added that the UNESCO decision to withhold aid to Israel is a "shameful example of the transformation of the international humanitarian organization into a political weapon.

At a press conference announcing the letter, Sen. Jacob K, Javits (R.N.Y.) disclosed that Secretary of State Henry A, Kissinger had told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that the U.S. has "never suggested to Israel that the U.S. has "never suggested to Israel that it negotiate with the PLO as long as the PLO has not accepted the legitimacy of the existence of Israel." Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D. Minn.) stressed that the 71 senators were recommending U.S. withdrawal from the UN but that they did not want the UN to go the way of the League of Nations, "powerless and useless." He said the U.S. should stress that the UN relate to member states and not political movements such as the PLO.

Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa. And there are Christmas trees, too!

No one asked but an innocuous wire service story, datelined Vatican City, and printed in the local press may have caused some concern amoung our neighbors.

The story quotes a Vatican weekly newspaper saying Santa Claus represents a "monstrous substitution" for the Christ child and "offends the faith."

The editorial in L'Osservatore delle Domenica also assailed the Christmas tree as "an attempt to substitute for the crib. . . and a certain sense of naturalism and paganism."

The objection apparently stems from the general public's acceptance of St. Nick and the tree as indicative of the holiday to the gradual exclusion of the true religious conception, the Nati-

A strict religious interpretation of the Holy day should unquestionably be total reverence and complete compliance with the Holy Writ. Those devout souls among us always have and will continue to adhere to the rigid theological celebration of the occasion and no amount of persuasion (if attempted) could dissuade them.

But Christmas Day with no distraction from all the solemnity it stands for, has, through the centuries grown, expanded, magnified into a spirit of Christmas. What started as a one-day observance is now a weeks-long holiday. What began with personal greetings of cheer from one to another is now the exchange of hundreds of millions of cards expressing joy. What commenced as an occasion for the discreet dispensation of charity for the less fortunate has developed into the indescriminate giving and receiving of gifts. The once simple recreation of one sion of the Crib has developed into addenda like trees, holly wreaths, tinsel and lights.

An occasion that was originally celebrated by just those of the Christian faith, now finds other sects, religions and beliefs looking forward to and rejoicing in the spirit of Christmas.

The metamorphosis of Christmas was not a straight, smooth road from the way it was, to what it is. There were bypaths, drawbacks, tangents and obstacles created by the natural course of history through the ages.
