NEW YORK -- Paul Zuckerman, ninth General Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, has been elected UJA President.

NEW YORK -- Samuel L. Haber, Executive Vice-Chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee, was awarded the Aliyah Decoration by Israeli Consul General David Rivlin in a ceremony in the Israeli Consulate in New York for his role in helping Europe's Jews make their way to the Holy Land both before and after 1948.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Israel will remain in the United Nations and continue its struggle against terrorism, Ambassador Yosef Tekoah told newsmen as he returned here from the 29th session of the UN General Assembly.

AVIV (WNS) Former Defense TEL Minister Moshe Dayan had to be rescued by security guards after parents who blamed him for the deaths of their sons in the Yom Kippur War besieged a building on the Bar Ilan University campus.

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
