HAIFA -- Sixty leading philosophers, sociologists, scientists, industrialists and legal experts from the United States, Canada, Europe and Israel, participating in the Technion-Wunsch International Symposium on Ethics in an Age of Pervasive Technology, voted unanimously to censure the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) for its recent decision to exclude Israel from the organization's regional activities.

HAIFA -- Rutgers University Anthropologist Robin Fox predicted that mankind has between 50 and 200 years left on this planet.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Jewish and Catholic leaders met in Rome Jan. 7-9 to discuss the present state of Catholic-Jewish relations in many parts of the world following the announce-ment of guidelines by the Vatican to implement the "Declaration on the Jews" issued in 1965 by the Second Vatican Council.
