SOVIETS CANCEL TRADE AGREEMENT CONGRESS UPHOLDS HUMAN RIGHTS

FORD SAYS US-ISRAEL INTERESTS MAY ALTER

NEW YORK (WNS) -- President Ford has indicated that while the United States and Israel's national interest now coincide this may not always be the case.

In an interview in Time magazine, the President was asked if there are "any concrete limits to our commitment to Israel." Ford replied: "It so happens that there is a substantial relationship at the present time between our national security interests and those of Israel. But in the final analysis, we have to judge what is in our national interest above any and all other considerations."

Ford said he would not rule out a formal U.S. guarantee to Israel "under some circumstances, but there has to be, in my judgment, some real progress (toward peace) there before that step would be taken."

Ford warned that prospects for a new war "are very, very serious. They get more serious every day that we don't get some action for further progress in the settlement of some of these disputes." Ford said the Soviet Union wants all of the Mideast issues decided Geneva.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger called a special press conference to announce that the Soviet Union had repudiated its 1972 trade agreement with the United States.

"The Soviet government has now informed us that it cannot accept a trading relationship based in the legislation recently enacted in this country," Kissinger said. "It considers this legislation as contravening both the 1972 Trade Agreement, which has called for an unconditional elimination of discriminatory trade restrictions, and the principle of noninterference in domestic affairs."

Kissinger told newsmen that since his exchange of letters with Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D. Wash.), which gave assurances of relaxed Soviet emigration procedures if the trade bill was adopted, "there have been many public statements that were difficult for the Soviet Union to accept, and the decision with respect to the Export-Import Bank ceiling was undoubtedly an important factor in leading to this turn of events."

Members of Congress were cautious in their reactions and stressed the blame was that of the Russians and not the U.S. The four Congressmen who led the fight for requirements on emigration, Senators Jackson, Abraham Ribicoff (D. Conn.), Jacob Javits (R. N.Y.), and Rep.
