announcement that the Soviet Union had repudiated the trade agreement with the United States sent shock waves through the Jewish community in the United States and abroad. But wisely American Jewish leaders as well as United States and Israeli officials have been cautious in their comments. What is at stake is not only the future of detente but the safety of the Soviet Jewish community, Caution is also called for because there is

no clear idea why the Soviets abrogated the treaty. Jewish leaders as well as Secretary of State Henry A, Kissinger believe that it was not the emigration issue but rather the limit Congress put on the amount of credit the Soviet Union could receive from the Export-Import Bank. There has also been some apeculation that the act was part of a power struggle now going on within the Kremlin.

Behind The Scenes At The United Nations

Hussien's Great Chance.

UNITED NATIONS (WUP) -- The youthful British-educated King Hussein has a great chance today to show himself as a true statesman by asserting himself definitely on the Palestinian question and the reby win the respect and admiration of the majority of nations around the world and at the same time release President Sadat of Egypt from the heavy burden imposed upon him by the PLO.

All he has to do is to accept the Israeli bid to enter into negotiations with the Israeli leaders on all pending Jordanian-Israeli-Palestinian issues and by doing so snatch away the initiative from Yasir Arafat and the PLO. Indeed, with good will shown by both sides, there is no reason whatsoever why the two contiguous nations cannot find, common interests for a mutually-satisfactory settlement.

Such a move on the part of the Hashemite ruler could break the deadlock now besetting the Palestinians, the majority of whom are within the Jordanian domain and the West Bank. The Arabs themselves claim that the Palestinian problem represents the root cause of the Middle East conflict.

Despite all the bluster of the PLO leaders and the belligerent pronouncements by the radical Arabs as to who really represents the legitimate of the plant of the Palestinians, King Hussein alone, in the view of this writer, holds the key to whatever settlement may eventually be reached with the Israelis on the entire Palestinian problem.

Whatever may develop from either Henry Kissinger's step-by-step approach or from the dubious Geneva talks, one thing stands out clear -- regardless of the Rabat decision and the subsequent UN endorsement of Arafet and the PLO -- King Hussein still figures importantly and his role cannot be dismissed so easily. Let's make no mistake about it, Amman remains a vital factor to reckon with in any future adjudication of the Middle East dilemma.

made in recent days to which must be added a friendly response his Royal Palace has given to a letter your correspondent recently wrote to the King on the question of Jordanian-Israeli relations.

In that letter the writer referred to some lengthy correspondence he had had with Hussein's late grandfather, Abdullah Ibn ElHussein. This correspondence, kept up for several years after World War II, dealt in detail with the common

World War II, dealt in detail with the common heritage shared by both peoples based upon the Bible and the Koran. Copies of some of this correspondence were included in your correspondent's letter which stated, in part:

"I hold be strong view that Allah-Jehovah would surely want you to assert yourself, that is, not to stand on the sidelines, but to seek a common understanding for a settlement on the whole Palestinian question with the children of Jacob-Israel."

The date of this letter was 29 November 1974. In less than two weeks the writer received the following reply dated Il December 1974 and written on the Royal stationery:

"Dear Mr. Horowitz:
"Upon personal instruction from His Majesty
King Hussein I, I have the honor to write to
you conveying a message of thanks and gratification for your thoughtfulness and sincerity shown to His Majesty in your letter of November 29,

"Your genuine concern for peace and justice is very much shared by His Majesty, and under his leadership Jordan continues to strive towards that goal."
