By all means the most controversial issue to date in the 58th Session came on the Assembly floor when the Equal Rights Amendment to the United States Constitution was passed by the lower house on a vote of 27 to 13. Prospects for final passage of the amendment were still dim since it was not evident whether it would ever come out of the Senate Judiciary Committee and, if so, is still expected to be de-feated on the floor of the Senate despite en-dorsement by Governor Mike O'Callaghan in

his State of the State Message.

AB-29 which would have abolished the Dairy Commission and allowed free enterprise to function entirely the pricing of milk appeared to take the form of revision of the commission to make it up of four dairy interest members and four consumer members.

Three measures aimed at judiciary reform were passed out of the Assembly Judiciary Committee. AJR-10 would allow the Supreme Court to hear oral arguments in cities other than the State Capitol. AJR-14 proposes merit-plan appointments of judicial officers to fill vacancies. AJR-17 makes the same provision for Justices of the Supreme Court, while AJR-15 would allow the present maximum of \$300 to be raised by the legislature for small claims court. All of these items, if they survive the legislative process in 1975 as they did in 1973, will then go before the voters in the next general election.

A hearing was also held in the Assembly Judiciary on a proposal to place the responsi-bility for refusing to hire aliens on the em-ployer with whom the aliens make application.
