WASHINGTON (WNS) Israel in the context of The United States is an overall peace settlement in the Middle East, Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger told a press conference.

He stressed that it was "axiomatic" that a final settlement had to have guarantees but noted that they would not be a substitute for a final settlement but a means of "re - enforcement," Kissinger said guarantees could come as part of a joint U.S. - Soviet agreement, a settlement guaranteed by the United Nations Security Nations Council, or a unilateral American guarantee.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Israelis were staggered as the Finance Minister Yehoshua Rabinowitz presented the Knesset with a new budget that includes new taxes that will bring higher lower living standards and possibly

increased unemployment.

The tax package includes a 7.5 percent sales tax on top of the existing ones; a 7.5 percent payroll tax to be paid by employers; and a 20 percent hike in the cost of postal services which includes telephone and telegraph service. The new taxes are designed to raise an addi-The new taxes are designed to raise an additional IL 2 billion from the Israeli public -- already burdened by one of the highest tax rates in the world -- to help finance a record IL 56 billion budget (about \$8.05 billion) for fiscal 1975.
