Terrorists Must Not Sobotage Negotiations



In honor of the occasion, a half dozen old timers wrote reflecting snatches of a personal experience with Spizzy for the house organ, Times Talk. We have one, too, but first, here's what Manny wrote:

## Manny Perlmutter, on Spiegel the Sportsman

When I started as a night office boy at The Times, young Spiegel was already showing other copy boys how to make the tough points on dice-10 and 4. He was the best craps shooter on the night shift. When he went out to cover police districts a few years later, the cops who wandered into the West Side, East Side and Centre Street Headquarters' reporters shacks were just as easy marks.

Over the years, he managed to get to the dice tables at Las Vegas-but with indifferent success against the pros. Occasionally he got some support from Jack Tell, a former caption writer on The Times picture desk who now puts out an English-Jewish publication in Vegas. Irving and I are grateful to Jack Tell. When

Jack was on The Times, he was a friend of Joe Russell, a talent scout of chorines for the Copacabana and Latin Quarter. Sometimes, when I finished the late-night shift on rewrite, Irving would join me and Jack and we would meet Russell at burlesque publicist Eddie Jaffe's pad next to movie publicist's Irving Kaufman on West 48th Street for a beer and dialogue with some chorus recruit. It was educational.

Spizzy was a frequent companion with us, covering night clubs and vaudeville in the years we were doubling for Billboard, the theatrical weekly. One night, on the way to a Village joint to see what was new in talent, acts and routines, we stopped at Manhattan Center, where Spizzy had been assigned to cover an annual union dinner.

It was one of those affairs where every soup and fish probably was rented and you had to look hard for a straight nose. Spizzy spoke to the boss men on the dais, phoned in his story and off we went, before the dinner ended, to witness some of the reasons that killed vaude ville.

On the way out of the club two hours later Spizzy stepped into a phone booth to check whether his story in the Times was okay. We can't repeat what the city editor apparently called Spizzy because this is a family newspaper. But from the look on his face he could have joined the Klu Klux Klan without a sheet.

"What happened?" we asked. "It was just a routine dinner affair." Spizzy gulped, "after we left that 'routine affair' two waterfront union delage

Spizzy guiped, "after we left that 'routine affair' two waterfront union delegates were shot dead at a ringside table." Spizzy survived that one with a two-week enforced vacation, but for years after, any function he covered he left with the sweepers. He's a good gambler, a better reporter and the best of men.
