Passover Marvel

(The following information was gathered from the Columbia Encyclopedia, The Story of Pesach published by a commercial matzoth company, and Tolstoi.)

How much can, be added to a story that has been commemorated and told in every Jewish family during the annual Seder? True, each year the ceremonial portion of the traditional party dwindles, while the menu for the feast keeps expanding in proportion to the new products that hit the market, labled Kosher for Passover. The soup-to-nuts Seder now includes canned soups, frozen meats, all flavors of soda pop, many kinds of candy and after-dinner mints. many kinds of candy and after-dinner mints -all legitimately in keeping with Passover dietary laws, and stylish.

But the story persists, nevertheless, It had its inception long before Moses, when Jacob's son Joseph, was sold into slavery by his brothers.
