WASH. (WNS) -- The House of Representa-tives adopted a \$3.5 billion Foreign Aid Assistance Assistance providing assistance for the fiscal year ending June 30 by a 313-201 vote.

Israel was allocated \$324.5 million in economic aid: \$300 million in military aid for which \$200 million are in credits, and \$40 for Soviet million refugee resettlement. Egypt \$250 was granted million economic aid; Jordan \$77 million in economic aid and \$100 million in military aid, and \$100 million was set aside for Middle East "requirements" which is understood to be for Syria. The bill will now be taken up in the Senate,

Criticism of the bill, mostly from con-servative congresscongressmen, was directed at spending money for foreign aid at a time of economic stress at home, and helping nations hostile to the United States, Several congressmen spoke up strongly for aid to Israel.

Rep. Garner Shriver (R. Kansas) urged Congress to "give our Secretary of State the leverage he needs in his current attempt to cure a more peaceful climate in Middle East." the Rep. Clarence D. Long (D. Md.) declared; For those who might think this is too much for Israel, let me remind them that

Israel's adversaries have been getting have have been getting too much more foreign aid from many donors. including the United States." Rep. Charles A, Vanik (D. Ohio) said that in the current ne-gotiations "Israel will require not only assurances from Egypt but assurances from our country that she will be able to maintain the capability to deter future Arab aggres-

WASH, (WNS) -- The Senate has adopted a \$3.5 billion Foreign Aid Bill Aid Bill providing Israel \$649.5 million in economic and foreign aid, \$16 million less than in the House bill.

The two versions now will have to go to Senate-House confer-ence. The difference between the two versions on aid to Israel is in the appropriation for Sovier refugees in Israel which the Senate reduced from \$40 million to \$25 million. Funds for the Arab countries remain unchanged with economic grants of \$250 million for Egypt, \$77 million for Jordan and \$100 million for Middle East requirements, meaning Syria, as well as \$100 million in military aid for Jordan.
