JERUSALEM (WNS) -- President Ford sent President Ephraim Katzir a message on Israel's 27th Independence Day expressing "warm greet-ings and best wishes for the peace and pros-perity of Israel."

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Jews in Miami and Philadelphia and Jews and non-Jews in Chicago are conducting a hunger strike in sympathy with a fast by three Moscow Jewish activists and their families, Vladimir Slepak, Aleksandr Lunts and Vladimir Prestin.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Israel Foreign Minister Yigal Allon arrived in New York after a whirl-wind tour of four American cities in which he met with some 1500 American Jewish leaders in an "Operation Israel" effort of the United Jewish Appeal.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- World Jewry must help Israel explain to the world the justice of its political position, Pinhas Sapir, chairman of the World Zionist Organization, said in his Independence Day message.

UNITED NATIONS (WNS) -- The Security Council by a 13-0 vote has extended the man-date of the United Nations Emergency Force in the Sinai buffer zone between Egyptian and Israeli troops for three months.

TEL A VIV (WNS) -- The beaches at Netanya and vicinity have been closed to the public because of thousands of lethal bomb detonators which have been washed ashore.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Rabbi 'Meir Kahane, founder of the Jewish Defense League, who was sentenced last month to a one-year term in federal prison, is being allowed to leave a Manhattan half-way house for prisoners for seven hours a day in order to go to prayers and eat kosher food.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- A soviet civilian jet airliner, which violated Israeli air space over the Sinal, was permitted to return to Cairo airport by the Israeli Air Force.
