

FORD'S 'CAUTION' IN REASSESSMENT INVITES A HARDENED ARAB POSITION

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- "THE ONLY WAY WE CAN PREVENT WAR IN THE MIDDLE EAST IS TO LET THE WORLD KNOW THAT THE UNITED STATES IS NOT GOING TO PERMIT ISRAEL TO BECOME VULNERABLE TO ATTACK BY THE ARAB STATES," REP. CLAUDE PEPPER (D. FLA.) TOLD THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE B'NAI B'RITH COMMISSION ON COMMUNITY VOLUNTEER SERVICES, PEPPER DEPLORED STATEMENTS BY PRESIDENT FORD INDICATING WHITE HOUSE IMPATIENCE OVER ISRAEL'S REFUSAL TO CONCEDE TERRITORY TO EGYPT DURING THE RECENT NEGOTIATIONS CONDUCTED BY SECRETARY OF STATE HENRY A. KISSINGER, THIS ONLY ENCOURAGES ARAB INTRANSIGENCE, PEPPER SAID, HE SAID ISRAEL WAS RIGHT TO REPUSE TO GIVE UP ANY TERRITORY IN THE FACE OF EGYPT'S REFUSAL TO MAKE CORRESPONDING POLITICAL CONCESSIONS.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- President Ford expressed a decided coolness toward Israel during an interview that was broadcast live over CBS radio and Television.

Some observers here saw his remarks as almost an invitation to the Arabs to-harden their position. In New York, Rabbi Israel Miller, chairman of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations, commended: "We are concerned lest the Arab governments misread and misinterpret the President's remarks as an invitation to harden their line to re-institute the oil embargo and to

istic concealment" the anti-Jewish discrimination practiced by the government of Saudi Arabia.

An AJCongress spokesmansaid the statement was adopted last June by the joint U.S. - Saudi Arabian U. S. - Sauc. Commission but re-unpublimained "unpubli-cized" until now. In a letter to Simon, Rabbi Arthur Hertzberg, AJCongress presi-dent, urged Simon to repudiate the state-ment which deals with manpower training in Saudi Arabia and stipulates that the pro-grams "would be sensitive to the social. political and religious contexts of Saudi contexts of Arabia."

This means the U.S. has agreed to exclude Jews from these programs, according to Rabbi Hertzberg. He suggested that instead of agreeing to Saudi Arabia's conditions "our country's representatives must insist upon a corresponding and commensurate requirement that these programs be equally responsible to the traditions and practices of our country."

JOHN McCORMICK is a newcomer to politics and he is determined, if elected, to make it his one and only term in office. His sincerity and honesty are displayed by an affidavit of service to the community, which he signed and posted in the court house. You can't beat a sworn
