the day of the State of Israel's creation, May 7, 1948, her claim to existence was challenged and it is still being gravely challenged today. She has been forced to fight two major wars on her soil with her Arab adversaries. Her people have lived much of their lives in fear and apprehension of war. Yet the fact that she remains a sovereign state is a glowing testimonial to the resolve of her people to remain free.

Unfortunately this year as in so many past years, peace for Israel does not appear on the horizon. An additional problem for the Israelis is their concern of dwindling American support. They look for the leadership of our Government to renew their commitment to the preservation of the Israeli state, and the expansion of our efforts to bring peace to the explosive Middle Eastern sector of the world,

Despite more than a quarter century of adversities, Israel remains through a sense of solidarity and perseverance among her people, a strong and vibrant nation. There are many whose genius and dedication have contributed to the present day State of Israel. I wish to salute two great leaders in particular, the late David Ben-Gurion, founder of the State of Israel, whose death a little over a year ago plunged the entire nation of Israel into a prolonged period of mourning. The other leader is former Prime Minister Golda Meir, who led the people of Israel with distinction during its most challenging days and continues to provide inspirational leadership. The first generation of Israelis worked long

The first generation of Israelis worked long and hard toward the common goal of developing their nation into a respectable world power. They are weary of the bloodshed and anguish which has tormented them throughout these years. Israel's second generation of citizens have begun to assert themselves toward achieving similar goals. Let us fervently hope that theirs can be a generation of peace. There is no greater international challenge before America today.
