Behind The Scenes At The United Nations

Mockery of Human Rights

UNITED NATIONS (WUP) -- In the face of eries of vicious attacks launched against Israel by the self-righteous Syrians, the Soviets, the Egyptians and their friends in a committee that dealt with human rights here last week, the Israeli Ambassador Ovadia Soffer took the occasion to remind the delegates of Syria's oppression of its Jewish citizens and the Soviet

oppression of its Jewish Citizens and the Soviet discrimination against its Jews.

"Is it inconceivable," he asked the Committee "that the world has not learned anything from the terrible lesson of the Holocaust? Only 30 years have passed since over one third of the Jewish nation was mercilessly and system. tematically exterminated while the rest of the world stood silent," he declared. "And yet, the very moment I am speaking to you, Jews, again, Jews are gathered in ghettoes, denied of every elementary and fundamental civil right and completely isolated from the outside world."

outside world."

Ambassador Soffer was referring to the plight of the remaining Jews in Syria who are "the victims of humilitating persecution and oppression in every sphere of life." He also had much to say after the difficult situation in which the Soviet Jews find themselves. "It is regrettable." he said, "that after so many debates and discussions we must come before you and state that anti-Semitism, in one guise or another, is still rampant in the USSR. In or another, is still rampant in the USSR. In the last two years," he pointed out, "one hundred full-length books of an anti-Semitic content were published under the suapices of the authorities."

Throughout the sessions of the Social Committee, the violators of human rights, as they affect the Jewish people, had the hutzpah to charge Israel exactly with what they themselves are guilty of -- and the thought immediately struck the mind of your correspondent: "auf dem ganev brent dos hitel!" And so it is, the thief always suspects his neighbor of doing what he does.

Thus, in his right of reply, Mr. Soffer stated:
"We have been subjected to the usual recriminations and repetitious slander and distortions." of facts by the Syrian representative and his supporters. This," he noted, "is the common practice to divert the attention of this Committee and dodge the issue of their outrageous violations of human rights,"

Ambassador Soffer then challenged the Syrian delegate to deny the restrictions Damascus has imposed upon its Jews, such as the ban on emigration; the law requiring special permits to travel further than a few miles from their homes; the carrying of a special identification card with the word 'Jew' inscribed in red diagonally,

Soffer, similarly, challenged the Soviet spokesman in the Committee "to bring proof that his Government has done anything at all to ease the plight of Russian Jewry in the face

of a flood of appeals from all parts of the world."

And what were their replies? Their usual professions of utter innocence of any wrong-doing amid an intensified attack against the

In another right of reply, Ambassador Soffer stated that "it is regrettable that the Arab representatives always manage to monopolize debates and drown the issues, especially those

debates and drown the issues, especially those damaging to them.

"What could better illustrate the nature of Arab propaganda," he said, "than the tears shed by the Egyptians on Archbishop Capucci, who was convicted in due process of law after he admitted smuggling arms and sabotage materials to terrorists. The sham protestations of the Egyptian reached the epitome of ridicule when he ineptly tried to defend the Archbishop, while, on the other hand, Yassir Arafat, in an interview published in the Beirut newspaper Al-Anwar, took pride in counting Capucci in his Al-Anwar, took pride in counting Capucci in his ranks."
