WASHINGTON (WNS) -- United States officials have acknowledged that the U.S. will supply Jordan with nearly 200"Hawk" ground-to-air missiles worth some \$100 million despite the freeze on new American arms to Israel pending completion of the Administration's re-

assessment of American Middle East policy, The deal was disclosed several days after King Hussein of Jordan attended a White House dinner and conferred with President Ford. State Department officials said this was not a new commitment since Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger gave Jordan "a verbal commitment"

more than a year ago to help its air defense.

Meanwhile Rep. Benjamin Rosenthal (D. NY)
has asked the House International Relations
Committee's subcommittee on political and military affairs to hold a hearing on the shipments of "Hawk" missiles to Jordan. "I am convinced more than ever that the so-called reassessment of U,S, policy in the Middle East is a thinly veiled disguise for a program of punishing Israel for the failure of American diplomacy in arriving at a Middle East settle-ment," Rosenthal declared. Rep. Jonathan Bingham (D. NY) said that the only possible conclusion to the sale is that it is "the latest turn of the screw in the Ford Administration's increasing pressure campaign designed to force Israel to agree to a settlement on Arab terms."

In other attacks on the Administration's Mideast policy, Sen. Lowell Weicker (R. Conn.) said it will lead to the "diplomatically expedient destruction of Israel" and "I will not be part" Weicker charged that the reassessment ordered by President Ford is the result of "personal emotion" stemming from Kissinger's failure to bring about a second-stage disengage-ment agreement between Israel and Egypt.

view published Maariv interview in Maariv that Premier Yitzhak Rabin's government har-bored "unrealistic expectations" and made demands on Egypt for non-belli-gerency which it known should have Egypt would not ac-cept. American Journalist Finds No Moderates in Egypt

Every Jew, and friend of the Jews, interested in the welfare and future of Israel, and every American concerned about the peace of the world, certainly wants to know how the "manin-the-street" Arab feels about Israel.

It has been our contention and probably many others, that the strife and controversy was agitated by the Arab leaders to maintain their status. We maintained, hopefully, that in time when the current heads of state were no longer

when the current heads of state were no longer in office, perhaps the mood would soften and the situation would level off.

This wishful reasoning was given encourage-ment by reports that the Arabs were weary of war and the dawn of understanding was about to break through on the horizon. If this were so, and we did not dig too deeply checking reports we wanted so much to hear, then the realization of peace for Israel was even closer than our hoped-for anticipation.

But now comes a story, written by an American journalist, who went to Egypt for the facts, which disproves our theory and allays hope for quick peace in the Mideast. Near East Report, a Washington letter on American policy in the near East, publishes a comment on a story in the current issue of Commentary, the magazine of the American Lewish Committee. Steeped in literature praising the new "moderation" in Egypt since the 1973 Yom Kippur war, journalist Joan Peters went to Egypt eager to witness this phenomenon for herself. But Ms. Perers "found virtually no evidence of such a change."
