"With this mentality, coupled with trillions of dollars of petrol power to further its aims, dollars Arab nationalism for years to come will be the biggest menace in Western Asia. doubt the cost of existence states as Israel, Lebanon and Iran will be immense it might not be within their ability to withstand the coming pressure (though, in the short run, Iran may have gained some peace).

"The Kurdish resistance," the writer concluded, "provided an opportunity to offset this threat, but unfortunately this opportunity has been lost. I am sure that most friends of peace in the Middle East will regret it. I hope that wisdom will finally prevail and that the friends of the Kurds, especially the Shah of Iran, will see to it that aid is resumed to the Kurds, if not for humanitarian reasons then at least for the sake of territorial integrity of Iran,"
