

Guy Takes Oath As Dist. Judge

Addehliar D. Guy was sworn in as the 11th Judge of the Eighth Judicial District Monday in ceremonies at the County Commission Chambers at 1 p.m.

Guy, 51, was recently appointed the newly created 11th Judgeship by Governor Mike O'Callaghan.

Swearing in Guy was Chief Justice Elmer M. Gunderson. Las Vegas attorneys Grant Sawyer and Harry Claiborne spoke briefly prior to the swearing in.

Guy, the first Black Judge in the Eighth Judicial District, became a Deputy District Attorney in 1966. In 1973 he was promoted to Chief Deputy, a post he has held ever since.

He was admitted to the Illinois Bar Association in 1957 and became a member of the Nevada Bar Association in 1966.

He obtained his law degree from the Loyola University of Law in 1957.

You often read about love affairs. I want to tell you about a love affair that's different -- one between a city and a rabbi. The city is San Antonio, Texas.

The rabbi is Dr. David Jacobson, a native of Cincinnati, a Ph. D. from Cambridge University, England, and one of the most versatile clergymen in the U.S.

Rabbi Jacobson has been in his post at Temple Beth-El since 1938; he is probably the minister with the longest tenure of any in his city.

What makes the rabbi so lovable is his genial personality, his scholarship and his eloquence.

He has been ecumenical long before the current surge of interfaithism. He has served on the board of a host of Catholic colleges and social agencies. The Lutherans are fond of him too, and his fell w-clergymen of all denominations look upon him as their favorite.

Dr. Jacobson is the first rabbi ever to be elected president of the National Conference of Social Welfare, being a sociologist of stature.

Author of several books on Judaism, the rabbi is a person of intellectual profundity but not your image of an aloof highbrow. His lovely wife, the former Helen Gugenheim, is a perfect counterpart to this rabbi who is locally useful, interreligiously active, and nationally renowned.

If you tour "San Antone," eventually your guide will say something to this effect, "And one of the sights you must see in our city is our rabbi, Dr. Jacobson."
