

JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- President Ford, in a message to the rededication ceremony of Washington's first synagogue, the original Adas Israel building, called it "a proud and happy occasion" for Washington and an "important occasion in our bicentennial."

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Although smoking may be harmful to the young and middle-aged, it does not seem to pose any danger to the elderly, Dr. Carl C. Seltzer of the Harvard School of Public Health told the 1500 delegates attending the International Gerontology Congress.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Dr. Walter Scheel, President of the Federal Republic of West Germany, said during a visit at the Leo Baeck Institute here that some of the great Jewish intellectuals, such as Sigmund Freud, Albert Einstein and Karl Marx, were persons of great German culture as well as being Jews.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- A delegation of 11 leaders of the National Association of Arab-Americans met for 20 minutes with President Ford and urged him to recognize the Palestine Liberation Organization and to condemn Israel for her attacks on terrorists bases in Lebanon.

BONN (WNS) -- Two Nazi criminals serving life terms have been pardoned by the Berlin Senate.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- The Foreign Ministry and Jewish leaders throughout the world have condemned the resolution equating Zionism with colonialism and calling for the elimination of both which was adopted by the International Women's Year Conference in Mexico City.

JERUSALEM (AJPA) -- Israeli experts in gerontology (the scientific study of old age and its diseases) have recommended that retirement age should not be fixed at 60 for a woman and 65 for a man, but should be flexible depending on the capabilities of the individual.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- A recommendation to cut \$261,250 in programs for the city's poor Jewish and other white ethnic groups has been criticized by Jerome Becker, president of the Metropolitan New York Coordinating Council on Jewish Poverty.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- President Ford has pledged continued United States "determined" support of the United Nations but he stressed the U.S. "will firmly resist efforts by any group of countries to exploit the machinery of the UN for narrow political interests or for parliamentary manipulation."

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Defense Minister Shimon Peres has urged the Labor Alignment to begin considering his proposal for a federation between Israel and the West Bank.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- The National Jewish Community Relations Advisory Council ended its annual meeting by warning that a continuing rise in unemployment could "accentuate polarization and hostility between groups" and urging the adoption of a federal budget in which "human needs" take priority over concerns about the size of the budget.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- A group of eight governors who visited the Soviet Union in May tried unsuccessfully to convince Soviet officials that the question of emigration for Soviet Jews is a human not a political problem, according to one of the governors, Marvin Mandel of Maryland.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- The government of Israel Investment Authority said here that Israel's accord with the European Common Market countries creates unique opportunities for American investors in Israel.

LONDON (WNS) -- Scotland Yard is searching for a "Carlos Martinez" suspected of being an Arab terrorist operating in London and Paris.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- The announcement of the construction of the Paley Center, a three-level cultural center devoted to an extensive study of both Jewish and Arab arts was announced here and in Jerusalem.
