

# JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Malcolm Toon, the New United States Ambassador to Israel, arrived with his wife and daughter and told newsmen that like all Americans he shared sympathy for Israel and its problems.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- The Absorption Ministry has increased recently assistance to immigrants who serve army compulsory service.

PARIS (WNS) -- The Movement Against Racism and Anti-Semitism is leading a drive to get signatures on an open letter appealing for the rehabilitation of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg and Morton Sobel. So far the letter has been signed by 10,000 people.

DETROIT (WNS) -- Following an intensive review by the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, the U.S. Attorney in Detroit has filed suit to revoke the citizenship of Rumanian Orthodox Bishop Valarian D. Trifa on grounds that he falsely denied his membership in the Rumanian Fascist "Iron Guard" and participation in pogroms against Rumanian Jews when he applied for naturalization.

LONDON (WNS) -- Prominent British Jews are being guarded by the police after their names were found on a list together with arms cache, the property of a South American named "Carlos Martinez" who is being sought in Britain and France for links with Arab terrorists.

NEW YORK -- UJA announced that there are already 250 Jewish leaders going on the Prime Minister's Mission to Israel in August; more than 300 community leaders have signed up for the annual study conference in October, and there are 400 reservations in the Young Leadership Cabinet's "Koach" Mission in November which is aiming for 1000 participants.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- If it would lead to improved Soviet-American trade relations and an increase in emigration for Soviet Jews the co-sponsors of the Jackson Amendment are prepared to consider changes in the amendment, according to Sen. Abraham D. Ribicoff (D.Conn.) who was one of 17 Senators who recently returned from a visit to the Soviet Union.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- The Arab boycott of American firms having Jewish or Israeli connections could have a "multiplier effect" spreading discrimination throughout American business, Rep. Elizabeth Holtzman (D, N.Y.) warned the House Judiciary Committee's subcommittee on monopolies and commercial law. It "is dangerous and intolerable."

NEW YORK (WNS) -- The National News Council has postponed its public hearing on Mike Wallace's "60 Minutes" program dealing with Syrian Jewry until a new program on Syrian Jewry, now being prepared, is shown next month.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Rep. Bella Abzug (D, NY) who was a non-voting Congressional advisor to the United States delegation to the United Nations Conference on Women, said the U.S. voted against the "Declaration of Mexico, 1975," which called for the elimination of "Zionism" because "we could never accept a resolution that talks about wiping out another nation.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- The eight bills which make up Israel's tax reform measures, including tax reduction, have been adopted overwhelmingly by the Knesset.

PARIS (WNS) -- British representatives blocked adoption of a resolution by the European Common Market Parliament condemning the terrorist bombing in Jerusalem and labeling the Palestine Liberation Organization as a threat to world peace, because the resolution could jeopardize the European-Arab dialogue.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- President Ford's request for most favored nation trade treatment for Rumania has been approved unanimously by the Senate Finance Committee, following approval in a House trade subcommittee by a 14-2 vote.

## REVISED BOOK RELEASED ON NEGOTIATIONS

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- A revised version of Matti Golan's book on the American-Israeli negotiations that led to the ceasefire agreement and the disengagement accords with Egypt and Syria has been released for publication by the Israeli military censor.

Golan, a political correspondent for Haaretz, told a press conference, "I believe today as I have always believed, that Israel is a free

democratic country which exercises freedom of speech, though I had some reservations about the banning of the book and the way it was done."

The original version was banned by the censors two months ago and the manuscript and all pertinent notes were seized, raising a furor among Israeli journalists and others.

American newspapers reported that the original book contained secret verbatim transcripts of private conversations between former Premier Golda Meir and Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger during which Kissinger allegedly made indiscreet remarks about world leaders. "None of these statements appear in my book and I don't know if Kissinger made any of the remarks mentioned," Golan said.
