JERUSALEM (WNS) -- The Israel govern-ment will compensate Jews who were imprisoned in Communist or Arab countries for Zionist activities and sustained physical or mental damages.

NEW YORK, Agroup of former Soviet Jews now living in Israel has written an open letter to U. S. President Gerald Ford and to Soviet Communist Party Secretary Leonid Brezhnev on behalf of a Soviet Jew-ish couple, Aba Stolyar and Gita Razovskaya, who had exit visas to Israel and had boarded the Moscow-Vienna plane on June 19, 1975 when Soviet authorities confiscated their visas and forcibly turned them back, claim-ing that ther "had been a mistake."

UNITED NATIONS (WNS) -- The United Nations Committee on Conferences has decided to hold the fifth Congress on Crime and Treatment of Offenders in Geneva despite the objections of Canada which wanted the conference postponed.

Meanwhile in Washington, a resolution urging the U. S. to withdraw from the General Assembly if Israel is expelled is being prepared for introduction in the House of Representatives.

In Israel, Foreign Minister Yigai Allon warned that if Israel was expelled from the General Assembly it would mean the end of the UN's role in the Middle East peace negotiations, including Geneva conference.

Several nations have joined the United States in opposing Israel's expulsion. Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia and Chancellor Helmut Schmidt of West Germany in a meeting in Helsinki agreed that if Israel were to be expelled it would mean the end of the world organization Australian Australian govern-ment leaders told Rabbi Arthur Hertzberg, president of the Ameican Jewish Congress, that Australia will oppose any expulsion move. The Swedish & Norwegian governments have announced they would vote against expulsion,

The nine members of the European Econ-" omic Community signed a declaration in Helsinki opposed to Israel's expulsion or suspension which they

said would be a "fla-grant violation "of the UN Charter.
