## JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS

UNITED NATIONS (WNS) -- Chaim Herzog, Israel's Ambassador to the United Nations, believes that although Arab extremists may still launch a move to expel Israel from the General Assembly, there is now a consensus among UN members that a move to expel would do more harm to the world organization than to Israel.

UNITED NATIONS (WNS) -- The Middle East situation requires "a global solution which will take into account all the aspects of the problem including recognition of the rights of the Palestinian people," UN Secretary General Kurt Waldheim told a gathering of diplomats.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Criticism of Egyptian President Anwar Sadat has been dropped by Israel's Arab language propaganda broadcasts aimed at Egyptian audiences. Instead, the Israel Radio is concentrating on Sadat's intentions to improve internal conditions.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Steps to dissolve itself have been begun by the government - owned Netivei Neft Company which has been operating the Abu Rodeis oilfields.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Aleksandr Slepak, the 23-year-old son of one of Moscow's leading Jewish activists, was sentenced to 15 days in detention after he was suddenly arrested, according to the National Conference on Soviet Jewry.

LONDON (WNS) -- An attempt by young Liberals to have Said Hammami, representative of the Palestine Liberation Organization in London address the London Liberal Party conference, was defeated by an overwhelming majority.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- A five-man Israeli weight lifting team, the first Israeli athletes in the Soviet Union since 1973, were swarmed over by thousands of Moscow Jews.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- A 24-hour flap between Jordan and the U.S. over conditions of the sale of 14 "Hawk" missile batteries ended with an announcement by the State Department that a "misunderstanding" has been "cleared up." A spokesman said the sale is going ahead on the basis of President Ford's letter to Congress which provided assurances that the missiles will be stationary and used only for defensive purposes.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Jews who immigrated to Israel from Egypt are attempting to block Israel's return of the Abu Rodeis oilfields to Egypt until they are compensated for the property they left behind in Egypt.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Israel initialed the military protocols on the Sinai being negotiated in Geneva and will sign it in full only after the U.S. Congress approves the stationing of American technicians to monitor Sinai early warning stations.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- New York City employers have been warned that any discrimination against Jews in deference to the Arab boycotr violates city law.

JERUSAL EM (WNS) -- Yom Kippur was peaceful throughout Israel although the memory of the fateful Day of Atonement in 1973 was still fresh in everyone's minds.

TEL AVIV (WNS) #- Finance Minister Yehoshua Rabinowitz returned from Washington less than satisfied with the amount of aid the United States is prepared to give Israel. He said he had hoped for at least \$2.5 billion but expects no more than \$2.3 billion, subject to approval of Congress.


