WASHINGTON (WNS) -- Sen, Richard Stone, the first Jewish senator from Florida, has announced he has accepted a personal apology from Jack Eckerd, defeated Republican candidate for injecting a religious issue into the 1974 Senatorial campaign.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- Pennsylvania Gov. Milton Shapp, 63, has announced his candidacy for the Democratic Party's Presidential nomination, becoming the first Jew to declare himself a major party candidate for the Presidency.

But many analysts claimed that the price index will go up at least 5 percent.
