UNITED NATIONS (WNS) -- Israel is "ready and willing" to engage in peace negotiations with all its neighbors and will "favor any mechanism which will advance the process of negotiations between the parties to the (Middle East) conflict," Israeli Foreign Minister Yigal Allon declared in an address to the 30th session of the General Assembly.

Allon, who is also Deputy Premier, announced Allon, who is also Deputy Premier, announced that Israel is prepared, even before peace is achieved, to consult with its neighbors to end the "senseless competition" of the Mideast arms race and to reach agreement with them to make the Middle East a nuclear-free zone. He affirmed that "the government of Israel is ready and willing to enter in peace talks with Syria without ing to enter in peace talks with Syria without any prior conditions as called for by (Security Council) Resolution 338 at any place and any time" even though Syria has repeatedly said it rejects "the whole concept of a genuine peace treaty with Israel." Allon said the Geneva peace conference could be resumed whenever the parties are ready for it following adequate preparations. Allon said Israel not only supports the Geneva conference but is also prepared to give "most earnest consideration" to Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger's proposal for informal, multi-lateral consultations on the Middle East.

The Israeli Foreign Minister said Israel knows

"that genuine peace in the Middle East must include a just and constructive solution for the Palestine Arab problem."
