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a decisive margin a resolution approving by stationing of American technicians in the Sinai passes, completing Congressional action on the measure. Israel immediately signed the second Sinai interim accord, thus putting it into effect.

The Senate vote came after two days of debate, in which a succession of crippling amendments were all knocked out before the Senate approved the resolution 70 to 18. The Senate version was identical to one approved earlier in the week by the House. Israel had made its signing of new interim agreement contingent

Congressional approval of the technicians plan. Shortly before the Senate voted approval, President Ford -- in apparent anticipation of ference that recruiting of the expected 200 technicians would begin promptly. In response to a question, the President said the technicians would be civilians, highly qualified, very techni-cally oriented individuals who have to operate very sophisticated equipment. The Senate reso-lution, like that of the House, specified that ap-proval of the technicians did not commit the United States to other assurances or undertakings in connection with the second Sinai agreement, to either Israel or Egypt.

Let us look at the ramifications of the signed pact between Israel and Egypt, now that the U.S. Congress has sanctioned the stationing of 200 technicians to man look-out posts on the Sinai. The world is looking towards the confronta-tion on the northern front between Israel and Syria. The U.N. mandate on the Syrian border is due to expire November 30. Just how much American pressure will be brought on Israel American pressure will be brought on Israel to come to a settlement before that date?

While multitudes of Jews throughout the world rejoice at the sunny prospect towards lasting peace, dark clouds of doubt are being cast in many areas. In Israel, opposition to the ad-ministration are sounding alarm that the deal involving the U.S. is selling out on their country. In America there are factions screaming we are getting involved in the Mideast conflict. Anti-Egyptian Arabs are condemning Egypt for re-Egyptian Arabs are condemning Egypt for re-cognition of Israel. Russia is agitating Syria to stand firm, while pouring billions in arms into that country. Syria is threatening to team up with Jordan for the next war on the books. The PLO is keeping the Moslem-Christian con-flict alive in Lebanon to prevent that country from sympathizing with the Israeli-Egyptian accord. And from all sides comes demands to accord. And from all sides comes demands to return Jerusalem to the Arabs.

Whew, and we thought the Egyptian accord would be welcomed by most as the first step towards lasting peace. In Israel, Likud leader Menahem Begin ac-

cused the government of surrender by stages. It had abandoned its terms five times during the negotiations.

Gen Moshe Dayan called it a simple with-

drawal and only a partial relaxation. The Haaretz newspaper said the immediate future offered little room for optimism. The Histradut's Davor said now the Syrians will push ahead with extremist demands. The afternoon paper, Yediot Aharenot claimed if Syria did not renew the U.N. mandate it would place Egypt in an uncomfortable position. The Jerusalem Post said the territorial integrity of the Golan Heights is no longer inviolable.

Rabin's opponents maintain the Prime Minister is no longer to be believed after he had stated there would be no withdrawals from the Sinai passes without a statement of non-belligerency by Egypt.
