PRES. FORD, GENTILES, LABOR LEADERS PROTEST ANTI-ZIONIST RESOLUTION

SADAT TAKES OFF, GETS NUCLEAR PLANTS

WASH. (WNS) -- Egyptian President Anwar Sadat ended his 10-day visit to the United States with an address to a joint session of Congress and the signing of an agreement for the United States to provide Egypt with two nuclear plants.

The agreement for the plants, which will provide more than half the power now generated by the Aswan Dam, was initialed at the State Department by Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger and Egyptian Foreign Minister Ismail Fahmy. Kissinger noted that the agreement "captures perhaps to a greater extent, more than any other event during this historic visit (by Sadat) the spirit of cooperation between our two nations" and is "testimony to the common commitment to peace in the area."

Fahmy said this was "the first agreement of its kind signed in the Middle East with the U.S." and noted that Egypt "is looking forward to more cooperation with the U.S." The agreement noted that "the same safeguard provisions and special measures will be included in both the U.S. cooperation agreements with Egypt and Israel respectively."

President Sadat in his address to Congress appealed "in the most emphatic terms" for them to support and understand the Palestinian people. He said that in his meeting with some senators and representatives he found "a keen interest in the cause of the Palestinians" and in exploring ways and means of solving their problems and putting an end to their predicament."

NEW YORK (WNS) -- As the United Nations General Assembly prepares for a debate on a resolution equating Zionism with racism, the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations has scheduled a massive demonstration in Manhattan's garment center to protest the "grotesque" resolution.

Rabbi Israel Miller, Presidents Conference chairman, said the demonstration would "voice the feelings of all Americans about this obnoxious and obscene display of anti-Semitism, at the United Nations." Other rallies are scheduled in Boston, Miami, Los Angeles, Dallas, Chicago, and elsewhere.

President Ford in an interview with Florida television newsmen said the United States is "doing all we possibly can do in the United Nations to defeat the resolution" and expressed optimism that it could be defeated.

In Jerusalem, Israeli Foreign Minister Yigal Allon told the Cabinet that several delegations at the UN were working to postpone the vote on the anti-Zionist resolution for another year, which he said stood a better chance than securing a majority vote against it.

Meanwhile, opposition to the resolution is mounting. Sixty-two representatives and observers of non-governmental organizations accredited to UNESCO have approved a statement given to Gaston Thorn, General Assembly president, denouncing the draft resolution as "a perversion of historical and contemporary fact."

A delegation of 23 national labor leaders

Hitler's United Nations

There is no question that the passage by the United Nations General Assembly of the hideous resolution equating Zionism with racism will stimulate anti-Semitism wherever the callous act is propagandized, which will be in every country that sanctioned the infamous motion.

There will be no public notification in those countries, of the extreme denunciations of the resolution by the nations that opposed its passage. Only the lie will be broadcast and headlined to the populace. Consequently, although most of those countries are already flagrant with anti-Semitism, further indignities will be heaped upon unfortunate Jews. We and all other Jews and righteous people in free countries will do everything in our power to bring relief to our suffering brothers as soon as humanly possible.

But for now the die has been cast by the Afro-Arab-Russian bloc at the U.N. So with calm, unemotional approach we attempt to determine, what, if any, good can emerge from this unfortunate circumstance. If our reasoning has any validity, it is possible a number of pluses for Israel could have been stimulated by the rash, scheming plot hatched to create havoc among world-wide Jews. Other devious plans have back-fired. Perhaps this one will, too.

Never before, certainly not during the present administration, has official Washington come out so strongly in defense of Israel. It could mean a tapering off of pressure upon the Jewish State, along with a harder approach to the appeasement of the Arab nations.

President Ford called the passage of the resolution, "deplorable and highly unjustified." Both the House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate unanimously condemned the resolution. U.S. Ambassador to the U.N. Moynihan took the podium after passage of the resolution and gravely declared a critical situation exists. He called it a day that will live in infamy. Moynihan stated it makes Zionism a form of Nazism, which is a lie, an overwhelmingly clear untruth. He said the U.S. does not acknowledge and will not abide by the infamous act. Moynihan sadly said the abomination of anti-Semitism has been sanctioned by the U.N.

Sen. Henry Jackson lost no time in emphasizing that Congress should keep in mind those who voted for the resolution and reduce foreign aid to those countries.
