

# JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS

WASHINGTON -- Senator Henry M. Jackson, joined by Senator Clifford P. Case (R-N.J.) and Representative James Scheuer (D. N.Y.) called on both houses of Congress to express the solidarity of the American people with the efforts of the Second Brussels Conference for Soviet Jewry.

BALTIMORE (WNS) -- The Baltimore Jewish Council has asked the United States Tennis Association to take "appropriate disciplinary action" against Ilie Nastase, the Rumanian tennis star, for an anti-Semitic remark at the international indoor tennis championships in nearby Catonsville. Nastase was accused of saying "there are too many Jews here."

PARIS (WNS) -- Fritz Merdsche, the former Gestapo chief of Orleans who was sentenced to death in France in absentia, is now living in Frankfurt, West Germany, according to Nazi-hunter Beate Klarsfeld.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- The State Department is apparently trying to take a middle course between Israeli Premier Yitzhak Rabin's statements in Washington that the heart of the Middle East crisis is Arab refusal to recognize the existence of Israel and Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs Harold Saunderson's recent testimony that the Palestinian question was the central issue.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- A group of foreign journalists, visiting Israeli troops at the Lebanese border, saw them fire a number of 120 mm. mortar shells at a hillside target between two Lebanese villages as a preventive fire because of suspicious movement which indicated that terrorists might have been preparing an ambush or infiltration of Israeli territory.

UNITED NATIONS (WNS) -- The resignation of Daniel P. Moynihan as the American Ambassador to the United Nations drew an expression of "the greatest of regret" from Israeli Ambassador Chaim Herzog.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- The police will continue to enforce the five-year old Supreme Court decision against Jewish religious services on the Temple Mount, site of the Mosque of Omar and El Aksa Mosque, Police Minister Shlomo Hillel announced.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- A 30 percent increase in aliya from the West was predicted at a meeting of the World Zionist Organization's aliya department.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Excessive travel abroad by department heads and directors of the World Zionist Organization and the Jewish Agency will be cut out, according to Yosef Almog, the newly-elected chairman of the WZO and the acting chairman of the Jewish Agency.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- The City Council has moved closer to renaming a street across from the United Nations as Zion Square. The street would be the westside of First Avenue between 42nd and 43rd Street, directly below the Isaiah Wall.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Four Moscow Jews have received exit visas from the Soviet Union, the National Conference on Soviet Jewry reported.

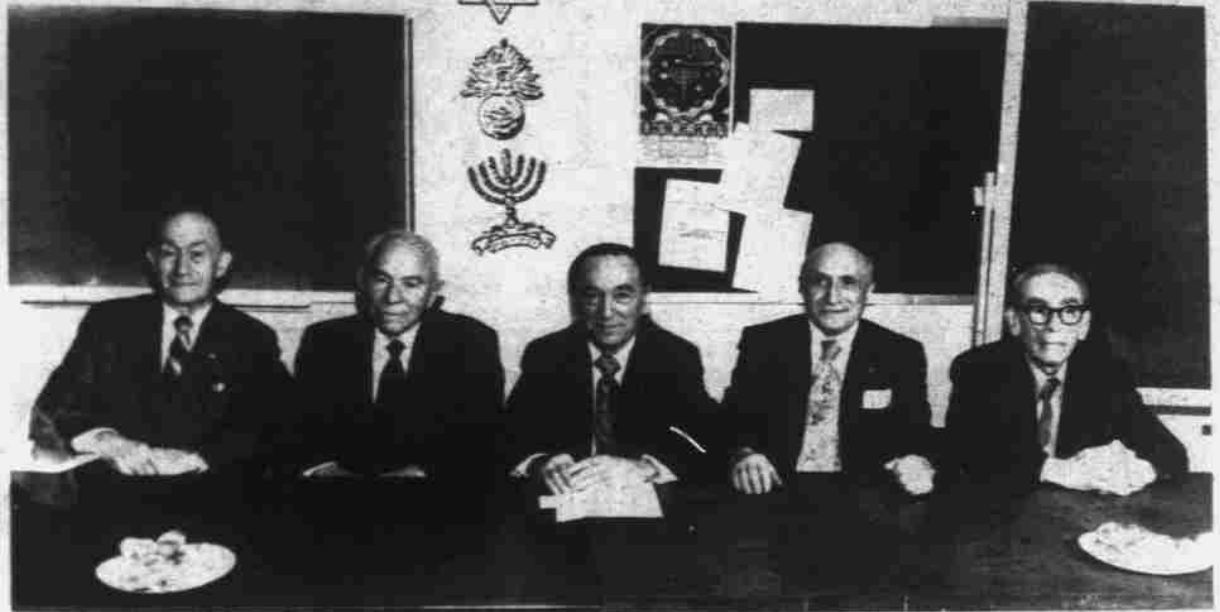
TEL AVIV (WNS) -- The fact that Israel has already incorporated the American surface-to-surface short range Lance missile was revealed during a visit by Defense Minister Shimon Peres and senior army officers to an artillery corps base.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- The State Department has formally asked the Soviet Union to cooperate in locating witnesses to crimes said to have been committed by alleged SS Nazi war criminals now living in the United States.

MONTREAL (WNS) -- Rabbi David Monson, president of the Zionist Organization of Canada, has appointed a committee to study the problems of integration of Canadian settlers in Israeli society.
