MAY 1ST LAW DAY USA

Law Day USA '76 will mark the 19th annual nationwide observance of this yearly event and will focus on our country's Bicentennial celebrations, it was announced by, James P. Logan, President of the Nevada Bar Association.

May 1, 1976 has been set aside by joint resolution of Congress and by Presidential proclamation, as a special occasion to commemor-ate this year's theme, "Two hundred years of liberty and law." Law Day '76 will be directed toward foster-

ing greater public understanding about the law ing greater public understanding about the taw and its institutions, how they serve to safe-guard our country and its people, what the role and rule of law is, how the ideal of "equal justice under law" is faring, and what changes in our laws and legal system are needed to help accelerate the achievement of this goal.

Mr. Logan emphasized that the primary purpose of the observance is to emphasize the values of living under a system of laws and independent courts that protect individual free-dom and make possible a free society. That Law Day USA occupies only a single calendar day merely is symbolic. It is an annual re-minder that while the principles embodied in the observance are constant, their vitality cannot be taken for granted, but must be nurtured and sustained by every citizen every day of the year.

President Logan announced the appointment of U.S. Magistrate, Joe Ward, as state chair-man with Bruce Robb, Washoe County, Pat Cashill, Ormsby County, Roland Berlanger, Pershing County, and Aubrey Goldberg, Clark County, to serve as vice chairmen in their respective districts.

Wiesenthal last year in his yearly report on Nazi wai war criminals stated during the war "Interpol archives were used by Heydrich and the RSHA (Nazi police system) for blackmailing...until TWO years ago SS (Un-tersturmfuer) Paul had been Dickopf the representative of the Federal Re-public of Germany at Interpol."
