## ISRAELI REDS INCITE ISRAELI ARABS TO STRIKE CAUSING VIOLENCE

### CARTER CALLS ISRAEL'S SETTLEMENTS PROPER

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Support for Israel's settlements in the occupied territories has come from former Georgia Governor

Jimmy Carter, a candidate for the Democratic Party's nomination for the Presidency.

Answering questions from an invited group of about 100 New York Jewish leaders, Carter said that Israel has never said the settlements are permanent and that he believes they are proper. He reiterated his earlier statements that if he was Premier of Israel he would not withdraw from the Golan Heights or East Jerusalem, including the holy places.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- A one-day general strike by Israeli Arabs resulted in six Arabs being killed and 31 injured and 38 Israeli soldiers, policemen and border policemen being hurt.

The deaths and injuries occurred during a series of violent clashes in the Galilee and the Sharon coastal plain north of Tel Aviv. The strike called by the pro-Moscow Rakah Party was the first general strike by Arabs in Israel's history. The strike itself was only partially successful with the Labor Exchange reporting that about 80 percent of the Arab work force going to work. But those who stayed home forced the shut-down of some factories in northern Israel and a number of construction sites employing Arab labor were idle. In East Jerusalem, shops in the Old City remained open but outside the walls all business was suspended and schools were closed. On the West Bank, Nablus, Tubas, Tulkarem, Kalkilya and Jenin were paralyzed by the strike, and there was a partial strike in Hebron, while business was conducted as usual in Ramallah and Bethlehem.

At a press conference in Nazareth, the Police Commissioner for northern Israel said the Arabs who were killed and injured were a result of the police and soldiers firing in self-defense against rampaging mobs. He said that in some cases Arab village leaders called the Israeli police for protection against rioters who were attacking the local councils.

The strike had been called by Rakah to protest plans to expropriate land from Arabs in the Galilee. Premier Yitzhak Rabin accused Rakah of fomenting the strike and the violence in an attempt to "tear up the fabric of cooperation between Jews and Arabs built up over the past 28 years." He promised, however, a full investigation. The Premier spoke in reply to a no confidence motion filed by the Rakah faction, headed by Meis Wilner, which was presented to an almost empty Knesset. The coalition parties and Likud were absent to protest what they considered Community hypocrisy in inciting violence and then seeking to blame the government for it.

Rabin expressed regret for the "pointless deaths" and praised the manner in which the law enforcement authorities had handled the situation. He said he was "happy to learn that most Israeli Arabs did not heed those who tried to incite them and continued their normal way of life." He said the ongoing efforts by successive Israeli governments, the Histadrut and by various political parties to give Israel Arabs full and equal rights had gained a large measure of success over the years.
