## WEST BANK MARCHES SPLIT JEWS, TOUCH OFF NEW ARAB UNREST WAVE

### JAVITS URGES MAJOR CONCESSIONS BY ISRAEL

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Israel must come up with far-reaching proposals for a Middle East peace containing major concessions by Israel, according to Sen. Jacob K. Javits (R, NY).

Reliable sources said that Javits, who came to Israel after visiting Arab countries, told Israeli leaders that unless they make concessions the United States would seek to impose its own solution along the lines of the Rogers Plan. According to these sources, Javits said that if the Arabs refused to accept a moderate plan including political concessions by Israel, the U.S. would back Israel strongly and unconditionally. Javits said in a radio interview that he believed that immediate progress lay in the direction of an agreement ending the state of war between Israel

and its Arab neighbors.

Javits reportedly told Premier Yitzhak Rabin that he believes Syria and especially Egypt want a peaceful solution to the Mideast problem. Javits also said that when he returns to Washington he will "honestly and eloquently" present Rabin's views of the \$550 million transitional quarter aid Israel is seeking from Washington.

Another visiting Republican, Sen. Charles Mathias of Maryland, was quoted as saying that his meeting with Arafat "broke no new ground" but "it was useful from my point of view for getting a better understanding of exactly what possibilities for a settlement might exist."

### Israelite Ads Pay

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- The two-day march through the West Bank by some 20,000 supporters of the militant nationalist Gush Emunim touched off a new wave of Arab unrest in West Bank towns and East Jerusalem.

The Gush Emunim march itself was peaceful starting in the Samarian hills and ending in Jericho. The route of march, which deliberately avoided major Arab population centers was protected by cordons of Israeli troops and was free of incidents. After arriving in Jericho the Gush Emunim marchers dispersed peacefully.

Meanwhile, thousands of Arabs marched from Ramallah to the Jerusalem suburb of Kaldania in a silent protest against the Gush Emunim march. In Nablus there were disturbances for three days after the march began and Israel troops used tear-gas and later rifle fire to disperse youths pelting them with stones. A 55-year-old Arab, Sayid Taher Jaba, was fatally shot and five other Arabs were seriously wounded. Two Israeli soldiers and a policeman were injured by stones in the Old City of Jerusalem when security forces broke up an anti-Israel march by some 200 schoolgirls. Reinforced troops dispersed demonstrators in Jenin and Tulkarem. In Tulkarem a curfew was imposed.

Shopkeepers who went on a protest strike throughout the West Bank were forced to return to their stores after Israeli troops smashed the locks.

Many cabinet members opposed the Gush Emunim march, but Defense Minister Shimon Peres supported it. The National Religious Party threatened to leave the government coalition if the march was banned. The Orthodox nationalists of Gush Emunim, supported by the NRP and var-

### Galilee Dilemma

Do not believe the headlines you are reading in the daily newspapers about Israeli Arab uprisings in the Galilee until you know the true facts surrounding the circumstances.

The administration in Israel is making every effort to reduce local Arab frustration, and probably will have the matter well in hand before long. Unfortunately the Arab countries and Russia will capitalize to the hilt propaganda-wise. They never miss a trick to undermine Israel and probably will blow up minor events away out of proportion.

That is why we hasten to explain the reason and purpose of exactly what is taking place and the cause of the Israeli-Arab discontent.

The northern portion of Israel, known as the Central Galilee, which borders on Lebanon and Syria, is one of the lesser developed areas of the country. Its population is sparse, about 135,000, of whom about 100,000 are Israeli Arabs.

In an attempt to even out the population density of the relatively small country for better progress and productivity, the government policy is to encourage and foster a dispersal of the inhabitants. Under the Galilee Development Plan there would be a concentration of development for Jewish, Arab and Druze urban centers. This meant new dwelling units, industrial plants, roads, water and sewage networks and all the necessities that make cities out of arid and desert areas.

To do so, it was necessary to "purchase" 2,825 acres of land from both Arabs and Jews. The 1,575 acres from 1184 Arab owners, consists of 1240 acres of barren soil not suitable for cultivation. The maximum to be taken from any one family is less than two acres and not a single Arab would be displaced. In addition the price to be paid is higher than the present market value, or land will be exchanged at a higher value depending on the projected use. In any case a dissatisfied owner has recourse to the courts.

There will be 11 new villages for Bedouin seeking a settled existence, which includes 1,400 dwelling units in Makr on 500 acres. There will be housing and industrial developments in Arab and Druze villages. In Nazareth, Arabs will be given 750 acres of new land, 88 of which belonged to the Israel government. In Carmiel, about one fourth of the 1875 acres are Arab owned.

There you have it. The whole purpose is to further the progress and development, which
