Despite this, Israel has survived four wars against overwhelming odds. The country may differ over how to solve its problems but it is united on essentials. Despite its economic problems. lems Israel continues to hold the door open for Jews from everywhere and aliys is still one of the major priorities of the Jewish State, Perhaps most important of all, Jews through-

out the world are not only willing to help Israel but feel they share a common destiny with the Israelis,

Premier Yitzhak Rabin may have best explained it in his Independence Day message when he said Israel's independence "draws a line be-tween past survival by chance and future existence by self-will; of being helplessly controlled by events and of controlling events by our own choice, means and purpose."

While we celebrate Israel's independence we

should not forget those Jews in the Arab countries and the Soviet Union who are not free. It is fitting that "Solidarity Sunday for Soviet Jewry" comes three days before Yom Haatzmaut. Jews across the country will be showing their support for Soviet Jewry. The biggest event is the annual massive march down New York's Fifth Avenue. Behind The Scenes At The United Nations

Noted Son's Tribute to Distinguished Father

UNITED NATIONS (WUP) -- Dr. Isaac Lewin, well - known figure here at the UN as an a well - known figure here at the CN as an accredited representative of the Agudath Israel World Organization to the Economic and Social Council and a scholar - author of note specializing in human rights, has paid high tribute to his late father, the renowned rabbi Aaron Lewin, who as a champion of Israel's rebirth and Torahtruths became one of the victims of the six mil-

In his latest book, entitled "Unto the Mountains," recently released by the Hebrew Publishing Company, Dr. Lewin resurrects three of the founders of Agudath Israel, his father

being one of them.

his Preface, Dr. Lewin, keenly attuned to the multiple troubles facing mankind today, notes that "we live in times probably unprecedented and unparalleled in their impact on history. Worlds have perished before our eyes; worlds have been born. Sometimes we today witness more in one day than did entire epochs in the past. In such times, we seek guidance from the piritual leaders of the generation, the 'Cedars of Lebanon' amidst the forest of confusion.'

He then reminds us that "our generation was blessed with such guidance. Three leaders of the Agudath Israel World Organization, Jacob Rosenheim, Rabbi Itzhak Meir Levin of Warsaw (later in Jerusalem) and Rabbi Aaron Lewin of Rzeszow, stood at the helm of World Orthodoxy during the first half of the present century and served the Jewish people admirably."

Devoting a special essay to each of the three,

Dr. Lewin paints a vivid and detailed picture of the valiant role each of the three Agudath Israel leaders played prior to the birth of Israel in keeping the flame of Judaism and the hope of a resurrected Israel alive among the Jewcommunities before - and during the two world wars.

The Agudath Israel was founded in Kattowitz, Poland, in the year 1912, and its first
'Knessiah Gedolah' or World Congress was held
in Vienna in 1923, the second in 1929, and the
third in 1937. In all of these conventions, Dr.
Lewin discloses, his father took an active if not

(Continued from Page 1) will be of special benefit to the Arab population with new employment opportunities and ser-vices. This had added importance because of the overall trend towards mechanization and modernization.

Finally, not one acre of Arab-owned land has been appropriated since 1965, and much of the land appropriated more than 15 years ago has been returned to former Arab owners.

So what happened?

The Rakah Communist Party in Israel, with four seats in the Knesset provoked a strike by Israeli Arabs to oppose the proposed ex-propriation of Arab lands. The Commys charged it was a plot to rob the Arabs. There were clashes and for the first time since 1948 Arab citizens attacked security forces. Shots were exchanged and some Arabs were killed, when Israeli soldiers' lives were endangered.

This means a whole new ball game between Israeli Jew and Israeli Arab. On the surface, since the establishment of the country 28 years ago, there has been quiet understanding. Many

firm friendships had developed.

The action of the Israeli Arabs, howsoever provoked, came as a deep shock to the majority of Jews in Israel. The relative economic standards of Israeli Arabs had created an illusion of togetherness which has gone up in smoke. Israel's Arab citizens are no longer to be con-sidered immune to Israel's relations with the

Where does Israel go from here?

Some want a tough policy against Arab na-tionalist pressures. Some want the Communists banned, Most favor encouraging the loyal Arab majority and throw the full weight of the law

against a hostile minority.

And the Israeli Arabs, especially the young intellectuals, who are graduating in increasing numbers from Israeli universities, should have more government posts open for them in every area except defense. The Arabs have to be integrated more at every level.

If the Arabs choose to ceoperate, the problem will be solved. If not, according to Foreign Minister Yigal Allon, it is "a black day for Jewish - Arab relations"
