Meanwhile, Ford indicated he might veto the entire foreign aid bill during a meeting with the Republican Congressional leadership. Rep. Robert Michel (R. Ill.) told reporters that the President had "grave concerns" about the authorization bill. He said the President believes the bill limits the President's authority on mat-ters which he feels are his prerogative, not that of Congress.

Ford reportedly objected to the Congressional veto of military sales to foreign countries that exceed \$25 million; Congressional veto of transfer of American weapons by a foreign power to a third country; and the anti-discrimination pro-visions that would cut off U.S. aid to a country that discriminates against Americans.
