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## Pressure on Israel

The underlying anxiety in the American Jewish community and in Israel that the support of the United States government for the latter eroding. They fear increased pressure will be put on the Jewish State to make more major concessions which is now being articulated more

openly by prominent people. Both Sen, Hubert H. Humphrey (D. Minn.) and former Defense Secretary James Schlesin-ger in recent speeches in Washington accused the Ford Administration of putting undue pressure on Israel. Humphrey stressed that the Administration simply does not understand that actions which are perceived to weaken the American commitment to Israel will not bring peace to the Middle East."

Schlesinger pointed out that "even - handedness is different from forcing either side into concessions" and that it is not right to blame and that it is not right to blame the lack of progress for peace in the Middle East on "the one nation prepared to accept a settlement."

Perhaps even more important is the pre-diction that no matter who is elected Presi-dent of the United States in November more pressure will be put on Israel in 1977. This prediction was made by such diverse persons as Israeli Premier Yitzhak Rabin; Dr. Nahum Goldmann, president of the World Jewish Con-gress, and Edward R. F. Sheehan, a writer and expert on the Middle East.

Rabin in a television interview said that it was possible that in 1977 "we shall see tendencies to concessions to the terrorist organizations and namely erosion in the U.S. posi-tion on the Palestinian issue." Goldmann said that after the U.S. elections, there will be pres-sure on Israel to withdraw to its pre-June 1967 borders because the U.S. is fed up with the Middle East and want to see a settlement. Sheehan in his "Foreign Policy" article on Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger's Middle East negotiations also predicted U.S. pressure on Israel for withdrawals as well as to negotiate with the PLO.

All this should not come as a surprise. It is time now for both the Israeli government and the American Jewish community to work on their strategies for combatting this develop-ment. Crying "Gevalt" next January will be too late.

The Israeli government must unite and develop policy on the Palestinian issue and the future of the administered territories that provides real concessions in return for real peace.

The American Jewish community must put pressure on candidates -- especially for the Presidency, but also for the House and Senateto see how they stand on Israel's security. And they must be held accountable for their statements when they take office.

As the Arabs and the Soviets continued in their insistence that Israel is a racist state in par with that of South Africa, the voice of the United States was heard again, but in tone it was not quite like that of Daniel Patrick Movnihan who had thundered forth last November declaring that "a great evil had been loosed upon the world" and who had warned the world body that "the terrible lie that had been told here on Zionism will live in infamy."

The new voice was that of Ambassador William Scranton. True, he did tell the Council w that "Zionism is not racism" and that the Assem-bly resolution 3379 "equating Zionism with racism" had "deformed the meaning of the terms" originally set forth in the "Decade for Action to Combat Racism." But this new Scranton voice was somewhat apologetic in tone and it lacked the dynamism of his predecessor. "The U.S.," he said, "will never accept the thesis of General Assembly resolution 3379 ,any more than it would agree that other legitimate national movements are to be condemned as forms of 'racism' or 'racial discrimiforms nation'

As a follow-up Scranton had to explain that "this attitude is not the policy of a particular Administration at a particular moment. It is a view strongly held throughout the Congress, the Executive Branch and the nation...What I have said today," he continued, "I have said not out of anger or self-righteousness, but as a deeply - felt expression of concern for the in-tegrity and vitality of the United Nations system."

Israelis are restless, he said, and somewhat discouraged. He appealed to the young Jews as the savior of the Jewish State. But Greenspun reminded us that through 5000 years every catastrophe for the Jews was

5000 years, every catastrophe for the Jews was saved by a miracle. He encouraged us to look for a miracle now. We certainly hope it will come about.

Scranton did admit that Zionism "is a justifiable and understandable manifestation of national feeling on the part of a people entitled to a homeland, whose claim to a homeland was recognized by the UN almost thirty years ago," noting further that "the final borders of that homeland have not been agreed upon..." Israel's enemies undoubtedly understood what he meant by this latter reference.

The morning following the Scranton speech, Ambassador Chaim Herzog spoke up in no un-certain terms. "Arab extremists and racists," he declared "have decided that they, and only they, are qualified to combat racism and that the participation of the Western countries and Israel is of no consequence for the success of the Decade to Combat Racism. They, who launched a war of genocide against the Kurlish people, they who massacred over half a mil-lion Blacks in Africa, they who hold a tiny lion Blacks in Africa, they who hold a tiny Jewish community hostage to their politics of hatred, they who state that from the Atlantic Ocean to the Persian Gulf only Arab presence is allowed, they and only they are the world authority on how to rid this globe of racism. "The Arabs by forcing the UN to equate Zionism with racism," Herzog continued, "have brought discredit to the Organization and caused

brought discredit to the Organization and caused a world revuslion. Thus, while we supported all moves to eliminate racism in the world, and there are no better witnesses to this fact than our African brothers -- with many of whose countries to this day, I am proud to say, we are continuing our development cooperation, we must regretfully speak against a resolution

on this subject. "Israel's position on racial discrimination has been clarified time and again, and does not have to be restated," Herzog told the Council.
