DETROIT (WNS) -- President Ford has asserted that his Administration's efforts to improve American relations with the Arab states will not be pursued "at the expense of our special relations with Israel."

He made his statement in a letter to Rep. William Broomfield (R. Mich.), a member of the House International Relations Committee, in which the President rejected allegations he vetoed the foreign aid authorization bill because it contained \$550 million in transitional quarter funds for Israel. The letter was released by Broomfield to the Detroit Jewish News as Ford arrived in Michigan to campaign for the Republican Presidential Primary.

"The fact is that I vetoed the bill because it would undermine the President's authority to conduct the decisive foreign policy that Israel, along with our other friends and allies rely upon," Ford wrote. He said that he "regretted that my veto has delayed the funds that the Israelis need so urgently. As soon as Congress sends me a bill, free of unacceptable restrictions, I will immediately sign it so the Israelis may receive these vital funds."

Meanwhile, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and the House International Relations Committee have approved new foreign aid authorization bills that it hopes the President will approve. The bill authorizes a foreign aid expenditure of \$0.9 billion, almost half of which is earmarked for Israel for a 27-month period covering the 1967 fiscal year that ends June 30, the 1977 fiscal year that begins October 1 and the transitional quarter between them. Under the bills, Israel would receive a total of \$4.5 billion during the 27 month period.

BALTIMORE (WNS) -- Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger appeared at a Baltimore Conservative synagogue in an attempt to assure American Jews about the United States attitude toward Israel.

The U.S. will always recognize its obligations to Israel "as the principal supporter" of its security and will "be understanding of Israel's special circumstances in the process of negotiations," Kissinger told some 1500 persons

RABIN FEARS U.S. REVERSAL ON PLO

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Concern that the United States may change its attitude on the Palestinian issue next year and make concessions to Arab terrorists was expressed by Premier Yitzhak Rabin in a television interview marking the beginning of Israel's Independence Day celebrations. "Today there are no

differences of opinion between Israel and the U.S. as regards the basic approach of how to promote the political process towards a Middle East peace," Rabin said. But, he added, "I cannot guarantee that the U.S. government will continue to think so forever. It is not to be ruled out that in 1977 we shall see tendencies to con-

cessions to the terrorist organizations, and namely, erosion in the U.S. position on the Palestinian issue." Despite these somber tones most Israelis forgot their foreign and domestic troubles during Independence Day and crowded beaches, parks and other recreational sites. There were no military parades as in the past and there was a minimum of official ceremonies.

Russian Roadblock

Russia, which has been the biggest obstacle in Israel-Arab relations by creating and maintaining a high state of tension in the Mideast, now is calling for a "radical political settlement" because of the danger of a new military explosion.

This is an old story with the Communists, not only in the Mideast, but all over the world. First they create a problem by causing controversy, then, if their plot is discovered they call for amnesty among the antagonists.

For years, Moscow has been supplying arms to the Arabs, maintaining and increasing Soviet influence. In addition, Russia has been rendering full political support to extreme factions to keep disturbances going. But the commies are waging a losing battle. They are finding out you cannot buy loyalty, no matter how high you pay, if it is based on a false premise. And it is slowly being discovered that the Russians are not concerned with honest efforts towards peace. Instead they are exploiting the Arabs for their own interests in the rich oil fields and prospects of trade.

They instigated the Yom Kippur War in 1973, which started out like a success for the Arabs. But when the tide turned and Israel had the Egyptian army bottled up, an urgent visit by Soviet Premier Kosygin saved the Egyptian army from complete collapse. It was then the Russians convinced the U.S. to intervene and persuade Israel to let the Egyptians out of the trap. But despite all promises the Soviets continued to send arms to the Arabs.

All the time, the Kremlin has been attempting to split the Arab world into progressives and reactionaries. Certain Arab leaders have seen through this fraud and on the surface are beginning to renounce allegiance to Russia.

That is why the Russians are calling for a resumption of the Geneva Peace Conference. It is exactly what the U.S. has been asking these many months. But Israel will not sit down with the Arabs if the Palestine Liberation Organization is in attendance, not until the terrorist group first renounces its quest to liquidate Israel and then recognizes the Jewish State's right to exist.

The P.L.O. will not accept these minimum conditions. Hence, Russia's plea for the peace conference are mere words, a stall for time.

The Russian statement, which it knew would not be acceptable, is timed to extension of the UN peacekeeping mandate later this month be-
